# UNUSUAL **IDEAS** TO MAKE A BUZZ



- Every year companies spend millions of dollars on advertising to create buzz about their products—in other words, to get people talking about them. Companies know that people like to talk about unusual, funny, and remarkable things. Nowadays, companies are using many creative ways to help products become more popular.
- One idea that can contribute to popularity is to do something very unusual. Red Bull™ is a company that makes energy drinks. They want people to feel energetic when they think about Red Bull™. So they sponsored an unusual event: 43-year-old Felix Baumgartner jumped from 39 kilometers up in space to set a new world record for skydiving. He traveled more than 1,300 kilometers per hour in a spacesuit with Red Bull™'s name on it. This is part of a
- new trend in advertising, in which companies pay for unusual events, hoping that customers will talk more about their products.
- Some other companies choose to do something surprising so that people will remember their product and spread their idea. A good example is a company called Blendtec<sup>™</sup>. Tom Dickson, Blendtec™'s owner, had an idea to make his blenders look more interesting. He made videos showing his blenders mixing up unusual things. He put items like smartphones, rakes, or sports equipment into one of the machines and asked, "Will it blend?" People were surprised to see a blender cut a smartphone into small pieces. Everyone talked about the videos and wanted to find out more about the blenders. Dickson was invited to demonstrate his products

- on TV shows. His blenders became much more popular, and he sold a lot more of them.
- The company that makes Doritos<sup>™</sup>, a snack food, had a different idea about creating buzz. They decided to get their customers involved. So they began a competition. They asked customers to make their own TV ads. Then they



- asked viewers to choose the ads that they liked the best. This created buzz because people like to participate and express their own opinions.
- Another way to make a product popular is to connect it in people's minds with something that they see often. To improve sales, the maker of Kit Kat™ chocolate bars used advertisements that connected Kit Kat™ bars with coffee. They hoped that every time people drank coffee, they would think of Kit Kat<sup>™</sup> bars. They were right. Sales improved by more than 50 percent when people connected Kit Kat™ bars with coffee.
- There are many ways that advertisers hope to make their products become popular: doing something surprising or exciting, asking customers to get involved, or connecting the product with something that people see regularly. Whatever method is used, the result is clear: more buzz and more popularity.

# HOW DO YOU DECIDE?

- How do you decide what clothing or book to buy or which restaurant to eat at? You may think that you decide for yourself. But according to studies of human behavior, people around us greatly influence our choices and decisions.
- 2 Psychologists say that "social proof" influences us. Social proof is how other people's actions influence us. When we are not sure what to do, we look at what others are doing. The actions of other people are the "proof1" of the right thing to do. One example of this is a sidewalk experiment. If you stand still on a busy sidewalk and look up into the sky, no one will copy your actions. As one person, you probably won't influence other strangers. But social researchers discovered something interesting in New York City. When a group of four people looked up at the sky on a busy sidewalk, 80% of the passersby<sup>2</sup>
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
- looked up at the sky. The passersby thought the four people must know something special. A group of people influences the behavior of others.
- Businesses are very interested in understanding social proof. They want to influence us to buy their products. For that reason, social proof is very important in advertising. Four groups of people give social proof: experts<sup>3</sup>, other consumers<sup>4</sup>, crowds, and friends. First, experts often influence our actions and purchases. For example, an expert on a TV health show may recommend a medicine. Because the expert is knowledgeable, we may follow the advice. Advertisers use experts for social proof.
- Other consumers also influence our purchases and show social proof. When a consumer uses a product, we listen to his or her opinion. On the Internet, consumers can express their opinions about products. For example, people write reviews of hotels and restaurants on travel websites. Online bookstores have book reviews from ordinary people. These websites are very popular because people are interested in consumers' opinions.
- The third type of social proof comes from crowds. McDonald's, the fast food giant, has a sign on every restaurant, "Billions and Billions Served." The crowds of people who eat at McDonald's are the social proof of McDonald's popularity. In a recent experiment, a major hotel company wanted to decrease the number of towels it washed. The first hotel room sign said

"Help us help the environment. Please reuse your bath towel." Not many people did. The hotel changed the sign to say, "Most guests in this hotel reuse their towels. Will you?" Twenty-six percent of the guests then reused their towels. Finally, they changed the sign

to say, "Most guests in this room reuse their towels. Will you?" 33% reused their towels. In this case, the actions of a group influenced other people. According to another study, when a restaurant marks certain dishes as "Our most popular," sales of those dishes increase by at least 13%. The behavior of other people can influence actions and purchases.

Finally, there is the social proof of friends. Friends influence us the most-more than experts, crowds, or other consumers. Our friends are usually more like us than other people, and we trust their recommendations. A quick text message or smartphone photo can show a new purchase. That is perhaps the best advertising of all, and for companies, it is free. It is simply friends talking about purchases. The next time you buy something, think about how you decided to buy it. It was probably a friend's influence!

Do you like some colors more than others? Most people do. We think carefully about color when we choose our clothes or a new backpack. But you may be unaware that the colors that you choose can tell us something about you. If you look carefully, you will find that even if you have clothes in a variety of different colors, there is always one color that you like more. This color probably makes you feel more comfortable. That is the color that can tell us something about your character.

For example, maybe you like to wear black. According to research in the field of psychology, the color black suggests that you are serious and intelligent. Maybe that is the reason that university students wear a long black robe when they graduate. Or you might choose to wear black as a sign of respect for someone who died. What if you like to wear blue? People who wear blue are confident and reliable. That may be why many uniforms and business suits are blue and it is a good color to wear to a job interview. Scientists at the University of British Columbia found that blue gives a feeling of calm and peacefulness. Psychologists say that people who wear blue are good and reliable parents and workers. And, of course, one of the most popular items of clothing is blue: blue jeans.

Tom Le's favorite color is red. He says, "I like red because it's a warm, bright color. Red makes me feel happy."



Valeria McCullock wears only blue. She says blue makes her feel peaceful. "Wearing blue for me is being in a dream all day," she says.



Elizabeth Sweetheart dresses in green. It makes her think of nature—trees, flowers, grass. "I missed nature when I moved to New York," she says.

People who wear bright shades of red get a lot of attention. They may have a lot of energy and get excited easily. Scientists from the University of Amsterdam say that the color green gives you a good mood. It **represents** peace and happiness. People who wear green may be very active and take good care of money. They are also caring and kind.
- Orange is a fun color and also very warm. Those who like to wear orange are cheerful and enjoy change. The color white suggests something new. That's why many people decide to wear something white when they are starting something new in their life, like getting married. People who like to wear white are very neat and organized in everything they do.
- Of course, colors may have different meanings in different cultures. A color may represent good feelings in one culture but bad feelings in another. For example, in the United States, white represents goodness. However, in India, China, and Japan, white can mean death! There are not many colors with universal meaning that are viewed exactly the same way in every country.



# The Importance of Color in Business



- If you walk into a McDonald's restaurant, what colors will you see? Probably yellow and red. And when you think about McDonald's, you will think about those two bright and cheerful colors. Every year large companies spend millions of dollars on advertising. They want you to buy their products and use their services, and they want you to remember their company name. Companies use color so that you will notice them and so that you will think about them when you see their colors. One research project showed that color helps people remember company names. Colors are very important to businesses.
- Blue is often used by computer companies. Microsoft and Dell use the color blue to show that their companies are serious and dependable. Like the sky and the ocean, blue can be both peaceful and powerful. To show that their computers are for serious people, many companies used to make their computers black or gray. But Apple decided that they wanted computers to be fun instead of serious. For that reason, they made their iMac computers in a variety of different colors in the late 1990s. Today, their computers, laptops, and cell phones come in a variety of colors.

- BP uses green and yellow for its colors. It is the only large oil company to use green. Green is the color of nature. Yellow is the color of the sun. Both colors are bright and cheerful. BP hopes that people will think of it as a friendly company. In addition, green may make you think of the environment. BP wants people to think of it as a company that cares about the environment.
- United Parcel Service (UPS) is a large delivery company. Its company color is brown. When UPS started in the 1920s, brown was a good color for a safe, reliable company. From the beginning, UPS used brown trucks and brown uniforms. In today's world, brown may seem like a boring color choice for a company. But UPS decided to make it a positive symbol of its business. Their ads ask, "What can brown do for you?" When people see the big brown UPS trucks, the company hopes they will think of excellent, dependable service.



All over the world, companies use color to establish their brand<sup>1</sup> and to encourage people to buy their products. Companies believe that customers respond strongly to their colors. It isn't surprising that companies carefully consider the colors for their products and their advertising.



# **WORK WITH THE READING**



A. INVESTIGATE Read the magazine article and gather information about what it means to be polite.



- Most people want to be polite and behave well around others. Being polite means knowing how to greet and talk to people. It means using good manners when eating. It means knowing how to give and receive gifts appropriately. Polite behavior in one country, however, may be impolite in another part of the world. Travelers need to understand the cultural differences in politeness so that they don't cause embarrassment.
- For instance, when people meet, they often shake hands. How long should a handshake be? Should you hold the other person's hand gently or firmly? In the United States, people prefer to shake hands firmly for a few seconds. In some Middle Eastern countries, people hold the person's hand gently for a longer time. Handshaking varies around the world.
- What about eye contact<sup>1</sup>? In some countries you show respect when you look someone directly in the eye. In other parts of the world, to look at someone directly is rude. To be respectful, a person looks down at the ground.
- There are also cultural differences in the way people use personal space<sup>2</sup>. When two people are talking, should they stand close together or far apart? Exactly how close should they stand? In North America, for instance, people usually stand about an arm's length apart during a conversation. However, in some countries in the Middle East and Latin America. people stand closer. It can be awkward if one person likes to stand close and the other person likes to stand farther apart.

<sup>1</sup> eye contact: a look directly into someone else's eyes

In some countries, making eye contact shows respect.

- Three authors wrote a book Kiss, Bow, or Shake Hands about cultural differences. In their book, they discuss greetings, gift-giving, and time. Around the world, cultures have different ideas about giving gifts. In the United States, if someone gives you a gift, you should open it while they are with you. That way they can see how happy you are to receive it. In China, you should open a gift after the person is gone.
- Another cultural difference is time. If someone invites you to dinner at their house at 6 p.m., what time should you get there? Should you arrive early, late, or exactly on time? In Germany, it is important to arrive on time. In Argentina, polite dinner guests usually come 30 to 60 minutes after the time of the invitation. When traveling, remember that each country has a different definition of being on time.

A final area to be careful about is body language, including gestures. Is it acceptable to touch a person on the shoulder? How do you wave goodbye or hello? How do you gesture to someone to "come here"? All of these can be different from one culture to another. In Vietnam, it is rude to touch someone on the head with the palm of the hand. The gesture for "come here" in the U.S. is only used for calling animals in some other countries.



Being polite means knowing how to give and receive gifts appropriately.

If you are going to live, work, or study in another country, it is important to learn the language. But it is also important to learn about cultural differences. This way, you can be polite and make a good impression. People around you will feel comfortable and respected. Politeness and good manners can be good for making friends, good for traveling, and good for business, too.







# VIRTUAL REALITY FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS


#### WHAT IS VIRTUAL REALITY?

Virtual reality, or VR, is a way to enter into a three-dimensional, computer-generated experience. In two dimensions—for example, in a book—images have length and width, but they have no depth. They appear flat. With VR, you wear special glasses to see the three dimensions, just like in the real world. VR gives you an experience with sight, sound, feeling, and sometimes even smell. With VR, you can move things around as if you are using your hands in the real world. You can make things appear larger or smaller, too.



#### **VIRTUAL REALITY FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS**

- Imagine that you want to become a doctor. You have studied hard for many years, and you have finally gotten into a good medical school. In your first year of medical school, one of your most important courses is anatomy. Anatomy is the study of everything in the human body. For example, you have to learn the name, location, and function of all 206 bones and more than 650 muscles. Would you prefer to learn this by using a book or by using virtual reality?
- Virtual reality, or VR, is the latest **technology** to help medical students learn about the human body. Usually, students study anatomy by using books. However, books do not show how everything fits together in three dimensions. With VR, students can remove layers of muscles and see how they are connected to bones. They can see how everything fits together. Of course, students still use anatomy textbooks. But, students learn best when they have a variety of ways to learn. VR is giving students a new way to learn anatomy.



VR is also giving medical students a new way to practice an important skill: the medical examination. A doctor **examines** a patient and gives a diagnosis¹. Students learn how to do a medical examination by reading a textbook, watching a doctor, and finally by doing it themselves. But it is a big jump from studying to examining a real patient. With VR, students can practice medical examinations before working with a real patient.



Here is how VR is used for learning medical examinations. The instructor chooses the **specific** medical **situation** for the virtual patient. Then the medical student puts on the VR glasses and starts the examination. The student clicks on each part of the body that she needs to check. The VR shows information about the patient. For example, if the student clicks on the eyes, it may say that the eyes are yellow. The student can also have the virtual patient move various body parts. Then the student makes a diagnosis, identifying the problem.

- When the student finishes, she will get a report on what she did correctly and what she missed in the examination. With VR for medical examinations, students are able to practice many times with virtual patients before examining real patients.
- One of the most exciting uses of VR in medical education is to practice a much more difficult situation: the hospital emergency room. Doctors are **under** a lot of **pressure**. They have to make life and death decisions quickly. Typically, medical students learn how to perform under pressure only by having experience in an emergency room. But students will not see a great variety of medical situations unless they are there for a long, long time.
- Fortunately, with VR, students can practice emergency room situations and learn. For example, in one situation, the VR patient may suddenly get a fast heartbeat. The heart monitor<sup>2</sup> changes, and that tells the doctor to do something now or else the patient will be in trouble, explains Dr. Joshua Sherman, an emergency room doctor in Los Angeles. He says that when you take action, you see a change in the VR patient. This "gives you positive reinforcement<sup>3</sup> that you did the correct thing, or the incorrect thing, if the situation gets worse. VR is amazing for that." During the VR experience, students can see the results of their actions.
- The education of medical students is extremely important because they will be our doctors someday. VR technology can help students improve their **performance** and make them better doctors in the future. Of course, nothing can **replace taking care of** real people in real situations. But, VR can help students practice their skills in new and exciting ways.

# THE TECHNOLOGY ADVANTAGE


- Since ancient times, athletes have always looked for ways to win competitions. Athletes can be winners with better training, better coaching, and better food. They can also improve performance with better equipment: better shoes, better skis, or a better tennis racquet. Even the early Greeks used engineering to make a better discus<sup>1</sup> to throw. However, people want sports to be fair. For this reason, sports organizations make rules about athletes, equipment, and the game itself.
- Nowadays, new technology is helping athletes. From high-tech clothing to artificial arms and legs, there are many new ways to improve performance. However, many people worry that technology can give some athletes an advantage. It can make competitions unfair. Also, often only wealthier athletes and teams can buy expensive, high-tech equipment. Do we want the best athlete to win or the athlete with the best equipment to win?
- The story of high-tech swimsuits shows how technology can make sports unfair. Several years ago, sports engineers **invented** a new material for swimsuits. It has many of the same qualities as shark<sup>2</sup> skin. When swimmers use full-body suits made of this material, they swim faster and float better. The material also sends more oxygen to swimmers' muscles.
- Companies introduced these new high-tech swimsuits in 2008. Soon after, swimmers using the suits began breaking world swim records at a surprising rate. In the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games, swimmers broke 25 world records. Twentythree of those swimmers wore the high-tech suits. By comparison, Olympic swimmers broke only eight world records in 2004. Then, in the 2009 World Championships. swimmers broke 43 world records. People knew that the new suits were helping athletes. In January 2010, the Fédération Internationale de Natation (International Swimming Federation, or FINA) banned the high-tech suits. Most competitive swimmers were happy about the ban. As one Olympic swimmer said, "Swimming is actually swimming again. It's not who's wearing what suit, who has what material. We're all under the same guidelines<sup>3</sup>."
- In the two years after the ban, swimmers broke only two world records. Clearly the expensive, high-tech suits were the reason behind the faster swimming times. The suits gave some swimmers an unfair advantage.

- Better equipment is not always a bad thing, of course. New equipment can certainly be good for a sport. For example, tennis racquets used to be wooden. The heavy rackets could break and cause injuries. In the 1980s, companies introduced new high-tech carbon racquets, which are easier and safer to use. The new racquets have made tennis more enjoyable for the average tennis player. Technology has improved equipment in all sports, from downhill skiing to bicycle racing.
- The question is this: When does technology create an unfair advantage? In the future, sports engineers may invent an artificial leg that is better than a real leg. Will it be acceptable for competitions? Do hightech contact lenses give golfers an advantage? Can runners use special shoes that help them run faster while using less energy? These questions do not have easy answers. We must make sure that technology does not make sports unfair. However, we should welcome improvements that make sports more enjoyable and safer for all.



In an opinion paragraph, you want to make the reader agree with your opinion, so you need to support your opinion with reasons and supporting details or examples.

Fitness watches can be addictive, so runners look at them all of the time. Second, fitness watches only show your time and your heart rate.

Third, if you focus on enjoying your run, your times will naturally improve.

Your paragraph should end with a strong concluding sentence. Your concluding sentence should restate the topic of your paragraph and your opinion about it.

For these reasons, I believe that runners depend too much on technology. I feel strongly that listening to your own body as you run will result in better times.

As technology becomes more and more advanced, athletes will soon have contact lenses that do more than correct vision problems. 





# A SUCCESSFUL FAMILY BUSINESS

- It started with the courage of a young man, Abdullah Al Hamad Al Zamil. Born in the small farming town of Onaiza, Saudi Arabia, Al Zamil was determined to start his own business. To do this, he moved from Saudi Arabia to Bahrain and began a trading business. It was 1926, and he was only 19 years old. At first, he traded mostly food items and textiles such as material for clothing and bedding. In the 1930s, he started his company. Soon, he decided to expand his business to include real estate: the buying and selling of land and buildings. He was a very successful businessperson, and his company
- grew quickly. Al Zamil expanded his business into other areas as well and built what was then one of the tallest buildings in Al Khobar, Saudi Arabia.
- Al Zamil had a large family, and his 12 sons were always an important part of the family business. After his death in 1961, the sons continued to work together to keep the Zamil Group going. They wanted the business to continue to grow in the spirit of their hardworking father, so they expanded into new areas. First, they invested in making parts for machines, and later they added the manufacturing of steel and glass. They worked to design new products and became experts in new technology.



- While running the company, Al Zamil's sons always remember what their parents taught them: to be modest<sup>1</sup>, honest, hardworking, and respectful of older generations<sup>2</sup>. The family makes decisions by consensus—that is, by making sure that everyone agrees before moving ahead. This practice helps keep a feeling of **unity**. Finally, demonstrating the sharp business sense<sup>3</sup> that they share with their father, Al Zamil's sons understand the value of taking risks from time to time. This, along with the **strength** in their close family relationship, has been a key to their success.
- Today, what began as a small family business over 85 years ago is now a huge **corporation**. The Zamil Group has more than 12,000 workers in over 60 countries. It also owns many different companies. They **manage** construction, shipbuilding, plastic, chemical, and paint companies. They have bought some smaller companies and also work as a partner with other companies in India, Germany, and the United States. Their goal is to deliver high-quality products and services around the world.
- It is difficult for a family business to remain strong over the years. The Zamils keep their company strong by separating<sup>4</sup> the owners from the managers and by being very professional. "It is necessary that the second and third generations prove their . . . skills to do the job properly," says Khalid A. Al Zamil. The next generation shouldn't have high positions just because they are sons of the owners, he adds. Clearly, the success of the Zamil Group is thanks to the strong leadership of the family members, combined with strong family values.

# The Challenge of Running a Family Business

In the United States, families own about 85 percent of all businesses.

However, less than 30 percent of these companies last more than 20 years. The companies fail, and the owners can't pass down the family businesses to their sons and daughters. Why is it so difficult for family businesses to survive?



- One reason may be changing times. Fifty years ago, many families owned local grocery stores. But today, small family-owned stores cannot compete with large supermarket chains. Today, most Mom and Pop stores are a thing of the past<sup>2</sup>. The way of life is another challenge in a family business. A successful company requires hard work and long hours. Younger generations may not want this lifestyle. They may want more freedom. In addition, sons and daughters may not have the same enthusiasm for the business as their parents.
- A successful family business **depends on** the family's strengths and **talents**. However, families also bring their weaknesses and personal problems to the workplace. Many families do not communicate well, and they are not good at solving problems together. These challenges often cause businesses to fail. According to Professor Randel Carlock, these problems are common. He says, "Being part of a family is very difficult. Being part of a family business is even more difficult." Love is important in a family, but love is not enough to run a family business. The business must achieve financial success.

- The Bancroft family is an interesting example. For 105 years, the Bancroft family owned The Wall Street Journal. It is one of the most famous newspapers in the United States. But there were many family problems. They did not communicate well, and they disagreed about many things. One person said that they couldn't even agree on where to go for lunch! The younger family members wanted the business to be more profitable. The older members thought the quality of the paper was more important than making money. In addition, the family let people outside of the family manage the newspaper. They did not take part in many important decisions. Finally, in 2007, all 33 of the Bancroft family owners agreed to sell the company. Although the business had lasted several generations, the Bancrofts eventually had to sell their company because they did not manage it well. In the end, many of their family relationships suffered.
- Many families dream of passing down their businesses to the next generation, but this requires careful planning and preparation. Good management is a key to success. All employees, especially family members, need to have clear responsibilities. Family business owners need to think about how decisions are made. Also, they should be realistic about the dreams and goals of the younger generation. Family businesses can be successful because of strong family ties<sup>3</sup>. But to succeed for more than one generation, families need to manage their businesses carefully.

A paragraph is a group of sentences about a single idea. The topic sentence introduces the audience to the topic. The concluding sentence may summarize the contents of the paragraph. The sentences in the middle provide details to support the main idea. All of the sentences in the paragraph should be about the same main idea. The sentences should be closely related to each other. This gives the paragraph unity—all parts of the paragraph work together to support a single main idea.

Sentences or ideas that are <u>not</u> closely related to the main idea are irrelevant they do not help explain and support the main idea.

To be relevant, your sentences should:

- be directly related to the main idea
- support the main idea, but not repeat it
- give new information or details that support the main idea
- not introduce an entirely new main idea that is different from the topic sentence

When you edit your writing, remove or change any sentences that are irrelevant. If all the sentences clearly contribute to the main idea, your paragraph will have unity.

Transition words also keep your paragraphs unified. Transition words help your paragraphs read smoothly from one sentence to the next. They help the reader see the connections between ideas. Transition words can serve several purposes:

to add: and, besides, finally, further, too, next, in addition, also, first (second, etc.)

to give an example: for example, for instance

to emphasize: definitely, obviously, always, certainly

Use transition words to help keep your paragraphs unified.





#### I SEE. ARE THERE OTHER PROBLEMS THAT STUDENTS HAVE?

Lots of students, especially when they are beginning, read just one word at a time. This **decreases** their reading speed. Don't read every word one by one. Instead, read in small groups of words or phrases that contain meaning. Here's an example of a sentence shown in thought groups. If you focus—on groups of words—together in thought groups—it is easier for your brain—to **process** the information. Reading faster can actually help you remember better. Your brain can understand groups of ideas better than just single words. Your goal should be to read **automatically** so that you can do it without thinking about individual words.

#### **HOW ELSE CAN STUDENTS READ FASTER AND BETTER?**

- For one thing, students can **benefit** from practicing to increase their reading speed. Here's how. Use a book that is not too difficult for you. Select a page or two from the book. Read the passage to see how long it takes you. Then go back and read the same passage again. Can you beat¹ your time? What if you try again? If you do this, you should be able to increase your reading speed. It will help you see what it feels like to read more quickly.
- Another way to read faster is to set a fast **pace** for yourself. Use your hand, a pencil, or a piece of paper to move quickly down the page. Then try to follow it with your eyes. It should be a little bit difficult to keep up. If it is too easy or feels very comfortable, then try increasing the speed. You want to provide yourself with a challenge. Think of reading faster as if it is a sport. If you want to get better, you need to push yourself out of your **comfort zone.**

#### DO YOU HAVE ANY OTHER GOOD IDEAS FOR STUDENTS?

Yes! For textbooks and more difficult material, I suggest that students mark up their books. By that, I mean that—as long as the book belongs to you—you shouldn't be afraid to write in it. Use a pen, pencil, or highlighter<sup>2</sup>. You can underline or highlight new vocabulary words and the main ideas. If you have

questions or ideas, don't be afraid to write them in the margins of the book. Good readers like to **interact** with the text, and writing is a good way to do this.

Finally, students can improve their English by making reading a habit. Students should read every day. The best idea is to read for pleasure—to read for enjoyment. The secret is to find a book that is not too difficult for you. If it is too hard, then you might be discouraged. You should also read books about things that are really interesting to you. That will help you stay interested in the subject matter.



- Believe it or not, the best advice that I got to increase my brain power actually came from my mother! She always told me to be sure to get enough sleep at night. It turns out that my mom was right! Scientists say getting enough sleep is important to help your brain work at a high level. During the day, your brain gets filled with information. At night, when you sleep, your brain continues to process that information. Scientists found that enough healthy sleep can increase people's ability to learn. But when people don't get enough sleep, they don't learn as well.
- OK, here's another tip from my mom: it's important to get enough exercise. When you exercise, you increase the movement of blood all through your body. This includes your brain. When your brain receives more blood, it can grow new **internal** pathways¹ to help you think better. Thanks, Mom! I'm going to go and work out now!


The key for me is to take notes in class. Writing something down helps me remember, and I need to understand something in order to write it down. There is something about the **physical** act of writing that helps me remember the ideas better. When I first tried to take notes, I felt **frustrated**. But I kept trying, and **eventually** my listening and comprehension skills got better. So that has worked really well for me. Also, I heard that researchers said that if you are taking notes in class, it is better to use a pen and paper rather than a laptop. In experiments, when students took notes by hand, they listened more actively and were better able to identify important **concepts**.


#### **ALEX LUKANOV FROM RUSSIA**

- My secret to success is to give my brain some variety. If I try to learn everything the same way every time, my brain won't find it interesting. So instead of always studying the same way, I introduce some variety into my study habits. So if I usually study in my bedroom, I try studying in the kitchen instead. Rather than studying only in the evening, I try studying during the afternoon. My brain responds well to things that are new.
- Another thing that helps me is to try to teach another student.

  When I take the time to study and then explain ideas to another person, it really helps me understand the subject and organize my ideas. When I am able to successfully teach another person, it helps me remember and process the information, too.







Not all infinitives are infinitives of purpose. An infinitive of purpose has the same meaning as *in order to*. If you insert the phrase *in order to*, it will help you figure out if an infinitive is one that shows purpose.

Infinitive of purpose: He called me to apologize. He called me in order to apologize. (same meaning) Not an infinitive of purpose: He called me and said that he wanted to apologize. He called me and said that he wanted in order to apologize. (not the same meaning and incorrect)

- because when we are in nature, our emotions are more positive and our thinking is clearer.
- Researchers at Stanford University in California did an experiment to find out how nature influences people (Bratman, et al, 2015). They divided 60 people into two groups. One group spent 50 minutes walking in a busy city. The other group spent 50 minutes walking in a natural area with trees and grass. They tested the people before and after their walks. The scientists found that after walking, the nature walkers showed different brain activity. Their brains showed less activity for negative



emotions and less stress. In addition, those people did better on memory tests than the city walkers. It was clear that walking in nature made a difference.

- Having a better understanding of the relationship between being in nature and mental health is important because more and more people live and work in large cities. Today, over 50% of the world's population lives in a city, and it will soon be 70%. Studies show that people living in cities have more mental health problems. City residents have more depression², anxiety³, and stress than residents of small towns. Scientists believe it may be because city residents have less time in nature.
- Nature influences city residents in other ways as well. According to studies at the University of Rochester, when people were in nature, they became more **generous** with their money and more interested in community. In other words, being in nature changed their behavior and **attitudes**. At the University of Pennsylvania, scientists

- found that creating green grassy areas made people feel safer and decreased crime. In addition, neighborhood parks encourage more physical activity and more social connections. Nature affects behavior of city residents in good ways. More nature in cities can result in stronger community connections, safer communities, and more physical activity.
- Scientists want to know what kind of nature experience makes a difference. Researchers have found that you don't need to go to a large park to benefit from nature. City residents can benefit from small parks, streets with trees, and small green spaces. Even a short time in nature can give you a mental and emotional rest that will help you throughout the day. Noticing nature around you lets your mind rest.
- So, the next time you feel tired, stressed, or unable to concentrate, take a short nature break. Take a walk or sit in a park, and notice the trees and sky. You may be surprised to find that a little nature makes a big difference.





#### **SINGAPORE**

Singapore is a small island nation. All of its people live in an urban area. With a population of over 5.6 million people, it is hard to believe that the city is the greenest, most environmentally friendly city in Asia. Because it is an island, the city cannot grow out. It can only grow up. Therefore, Singapore is a city of tall skyscrapers. However, the government requires all new buildings to have some plants. As a result, new buildings are often connected with other buildings by gardens or walking tracks. Rooftop gardens are very popular, and gardens often go up the sides of tall buildings.

City planners have used park areas and water areas to give the city a feeling of space. One of the most remarkable parks is the Gardens by the Bay. In addition to plants and flowers, huge artificial "supertrees" have plants in them and collect solar energy. The Gardens by the Bay have had over 40 million visitors. Although Singapore is crowded, its many gardens make it a wonderful city to live in.

#### CAIRO

Being green is a big challenge in the ancient city of Cairo, Egypt. With a population of 12 million people, the city is surrounded by desert and salt water. When Aga Khan IV visited Cairo in 1984, he saw a busy city that had no large park for residents to enjoy. He wanted to help build a park in the

middle of the city. Finding a location in this ancient city was a major challenge. Finally, they found a place: a 500-year-old trash dump in a poor neighborhood. The Aga Khan gave \$30 million (25.5 million euros) to create the park. After removing 80,000 truckloads of dirt and trash, Al-Azhar Park was finished in 2004.

Today this park is a sea of green. It has over 650,000 plants, fountains, pools, a lake, open-air theaters, cafes, and restaurants. There are beautiful views of Cairo's historic Old City, with its many famous, ancient mosques. Residents of the Old City are very proud of their neighborhood's history and the park. On the weekends, it is crowded with residents and tourists relaxing and playing in the park.

#### **VANCOUVER**

The busy seaside city of Vancouver is one of Canada's most densely populated cities. It has a population of over 630,000 and about 2.5 million people in the greater metropolitan area. Although Vancouver is not a huge city, it has big dreams. It is

planning on becoming the world's greenest city. In 2011, the city approved a Greenest City Action Plan. One of the goals is to make changes so that all Vancouver residents live within five minutes of a park, greenway, or other green space.

- One way that Vancouver is adding more nature is by adding trees. Its goal is to plant 150,000 trees in ten years. By the end of 2017, it had already planted 102,000 trees. The trees clean the air, give wildlife a place to live, and give residents a bit of nature. In addition, there is a program to "rewild" areas of the city. The idea is to return some park areas such as ponds and streams to their wild, natural condition. "Rewilded" areas also educate people about the wildlife that lives there.
- Perhaps the biggest change over the past ten years has been the increase in bicyclists. There are now over 800 miles of bike lanes in the city. People feel safe riding in the city. As a result, more and more people are bicycling to work and school. Bicyclists say that their daily rides help them feel connected with their communities and help them enjoy nature as they ride.





## UNIVERSITY HEALTH CENTER: COLD NEWS

- Kenji just finished a week of exams. In the weeks before the exams, he stayed up late, ate poorly, and felt stressed. After he finished his exams, he wanted to relax with his friends. But he felt **extremely** tired and sick. He had **developed** a terrible cold, so he went back to bed.
- Kenji has had a typical college experience: a bad cold that sends him to bed and slows him down for a week or so. Doctors say that college students have an average of four to six colds a year, more than the average adult, who has about two colds per year. According to health experts, college students have more colds and diseases than other students.



#### WHY DO COLLEGE STUDENTS GET MORE COLDS?

First, college students live, eat, and study very close together on a college campus. First year students often attend large classes with 200 students crowded into one big classroom. In addition, students often share cups, glasses, spoons, and forks. So, there are many opportunities for germs¹ to spread. Second, college students are under a lot of academic and social stress. Stress makes it harder for the body to fight disease. Finally, the lifestyle of a college student often means poor sleep, smoking, too much fast food, and other unhealthy habits. For these reasons, college students have more colds than other people.

#### WHAT ARE SYMPTOMS OF A COLD?

A cold usually starts with symptoms such as a sore throat, a headache, and low energy. Then the runny nose<sup>2</sup> starts. You may also have a cough. A cold can last a few days or a few weeks. Every cold is different because colds are caused by over 200 different viruses. Unlike a cold, the flu (influenza) is more severe, begins very suddenly, and causes a fever.

#### WHY CAN'T I TAKE AN ANTIBIOTIC3 FOR A COLD?

Currently, there is no cure for the common cold. Antibiotics will not help you feel better if you have a cold. Antibiotics only cure bacterial infections<sup>4</sup>, and a cold is caused by a virus. There are some medications that may help you feel better, but they will not make a cold go away.

#### WHY ARE COLDS MORE COMMON IN COLD WEATHER?

Cold weather is usually dry, and dry air makes it easier for viruses to spread. Viruses are found indoors, and that is where people stay during cold weather. Colds are also common in the spring and summer.

#### **HOW CAN I AVOID GETTING A COLD?**

First of all, your health is directly related to how well you take care of yourself. Get enough sleep, eat well, and make time to relax. Second, avoid people who have a cold. The cold virus spreads in little drops of moisture<sup>5</sup> in the air. When someone coughs or sneezes, he or she can spread a virus. Finally, wash your hands frequently. Virus germs can stay on a doorknob, computer keyboard, or table for up to 48 hours.

#### **HOW CAN I AVOID SPREADING A COLD TO OTHERS?**

The most important thing is to stay away from others and rest. It's also very important to cover your mouth with your elbow or a tissue when you sneeze. Wash your hands often because viruses are most often carried on your fingers. You can also wear a face mask, which prevents some of the virus droplets from traveling to others.

#### WHAT ELSE CAN I DO TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COLD VIRUSES OR OTHER INFECTIOUS DISEASES?

- Clean surfaces of things that are used often, such as desks, doorknobs, and cell phones.
  - Don't get too close to others who are sick.
  - Do not share food, glasses, cups, or knives, forks, and spoons. Also, do not share towels.
  - Don't travel when you are sick. You may infect others who are sitting close by.
- Getting a cold is common for college students, but you can take steps to stay healthy. If you do catch a cold, the best thing is to rest and avoid spreading it to others.



# PREVENTING DISEASE AROUND THE WORLD

- Jean Andersson-Swayze is on vacation. Well, not exactly vacation. Jean is a doctor, and she is taking time away from her usual work in the United States to take care of people in Haiti who are sick. Jean is part of a group of healthcare workers who try to help stop disease and help people live healthier lives around the world. She has worked with refugees1 in Greece, and she has made a number of trips to Haiti, including one after a bad earthquake.
- In 2015, a terrible virus called Ebola began to kill people in West Africa. Dr. Andersson-Swayze volunteered with the International Medical Corps to help treat the outbreak. The disease was extremely contagious—it spread very quickly-and she needed to wear a special suit to avoid catching the illness. Even though the doctor and others worked very hard to save them, many people died from the disease. Fortunately, the Ebola outbreak in West Africa is no longer an emergency.
- In addition to taking care of people who are already sick, the doctor is a strong believer in the prevention of disease. One of the most common reasons that people are sick around the world is because they do not have enough water or do not have clean water.



Without any water at all, people can die from dehydration. That is, their bodies don't have enough water to keep them alive. Other people in the world do have water, but it is not clean.

- People who drink water that is not clean are at risk of getting sick. More than 800,000 people die each year as a result of unsafe drinking water. The water may be contaminated by chemicals or human waste. More than 2 billion people do not have clean running water in their homes. Often, they must travel long distances every day to get to a dependable source of clean water to drink. Helping people get a supply of clean water can prevent many diseases and loss of life.
- Another helpful organization is called Pure Water for the World. This group and others help set up better access to clean drinking

- water. They work closely with local people and educate residents about the importance of clean water. It is essential not only to help people get clean water, but also to be sure that they know how to keep the water clean.
- In the same way that Dr. Andersson-Swayze is helping, others are also trying to stop disease. Many diseases are spread by insects, especially mosquitoes. In 2016, 445,000 people died from malaria, a disease that is spread by insects. If the disease is found early, it can be treated with drugs. But there is an easy way to take steps to prevent the disease: mosquito netting. A mosquito net is like a thin curtain that you use to cover your bed when you go to sleep. If the mosquitoes can't bite you, then they can't infect you with malaria. This is a very simple and inexpensive solution to a deadly problem.

- millions of dollars to help improve public health. The focus of this organization is on managing infectious diseases<sup>2</sup> and developing cures for the diseases that cause children to die when they are very young.
- In many parts of the world, poor public health is a severe problem. Some people such as Dr. Andersson-Swayze are trying to help people one by one. Organizations like Pure Water for the World and the Gates Foundation are looking at larger solutions. Perhaps together they can help solve these global issues.

#### Summarizing main ideas

When you **summarize**, you write a short version of what you read. You only include the most important points, not all of the small details. Writing a summary helps you see "the big picture," or the main message, of a text.

Look back at Paragraph 1 on page 180, which has five sentences. If we summarize the paragraph in one sentence, we could write:

Dr. Jean Andersson-Swayze travels around the world treating sick people, so they become well again.

Notice that the summary does not contain all of the details. It leaves out many of the points. For example, it doesn't say what countries she has visited. But that's OK. A summary is just the short version. We don't want all of those details.




