## What Is ACTIVE Reading?

ACTIVE reading is an approach to reading, advocated by Neil J Anderson, that focuses on the following elements:

## A = Activate Prior Knowledge

- Activation of background knowledge improves reading comprehension.
- Getting Ready and Before You Read sections elicit learners' prior knowledge, and generate interest in the topic, through use of visual prompts and questions.

## C = Cultivate Vocabulary

- Vocabulary plays a crucial role in the development of reading ability.
- *Vocabulary Comprehension* sections in each unit examine vocabulary items encountered in the main reading passage.
- *Vocabulary Skill* sections provide learners with explicit skills-based instruction in how to learn, process, and decipher new vocabulary.

## T = Think About Meaning

- In addition to testing for comprehension, the ACTIVE approach encourages learners to think deeply about the meaning of the text.
- Check Your Understanding questions focus learners on the main ideas and key details of the text.
- Critical Thinking questions require learners to go beyond reading comprehension to analyze each text and the author's intent.

## I = Increase Reading Fluency

- Conscious development of reading rate and comprehension are key ingredients in building reading fluency.
- Tips for Fluent Reading (pages 8 and 9) encourage learners to become more aware of their own reading habits
- Four Review Units reinforce learners' use of strategies and provide additional reading fluency practice.

## V = Verify Strategies

- Learners are encouraged to be aware of what they are doing and why they are doing it, as they read.
- Reading strategies are presented in the *Reading Skill* sections, the *Vocabulary Skill* sections, and the *Real Life Skill* section in each unit.
- Self Check sections in each Review Unit require learners to monitor the effectiveness of their own use of strategies.

## **E** = Evaluate Progress

- Both qualitative and quantitative evaluation of learners' progress is advocated.
- The Reading Rate Chart and the Reading Comprehension Chart allow learners to plot their achievements in building reading fluency.
- What Do You Think? sections provide opportunities for learners to show comprehension of the unit theme, through verbal or written discussion.

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## **Vocabulary Learning Tips**

Learning new vocabulary is an important part of learning to be a good reader. Remember that the letter **C** in **ACTIVE Skills for Reading** reminds us to **cultivate** vocabulary.

## 1 Decide if the word is worth learning now

As you read, you will find many words you do not know. You will slow your reading fluency if you stop at every new word. For example, you should stop to find out the meaning of a new word if:

- a. you read the same word many times.
- **b.** the word appears in the heading of a passage, or in the topic sentence of a paragraph—the sentence that gives the main idea of the paragraph.

## 2 Record information about new words you decide to learn

## 3 Learn words from the same family

For many important words in English that you will want to learn, the word is part of a word family. As you learn new words, learn words in the family from other parts of speech (nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, etc.).


## 4 Learn words that go with the key word you are learning

When we learn new words, it is important to learn what other words are frequently used with them. These are called collocations. Here is an example from a student's notebook.


## 5 Create a word web

A word web is a picture that helps you connect words together and helps you increase your vocabulary. Here is a word web for the word *frightened*:



## 6 Memorize common prefixes, roots, and suffixes

Many English words can be divided into different parts. We call these parts *prefixes*, *roots*, and *suffixes*. A *prefix* comes at the beginning of a word, a *suffix* comes at the end of a word, and the *root* is the main part of the word. In your vocabulary notebook, make a list of prefixes and suffixes as you come across them. On page 175 there is a list of prefixes and suffixes in this book. For example, look at the word *unhappily*.




## 7 Regularly review your vocabulary notebook

You should review the words in your vocabulary notebook very often. The more often you review your list of new words, the sooner you will be able to recognize the words when you see them during reading. Set up a schedule to go over the words you are learning.

## 8 Make vocabulary flash cards

Flash cards are easy to make, and you can carry them everywhere with you. You can use them to study while you are waiting for the bus, walking to school or work, or eating a meal. You can use the flash cards with your friends to guiz each other. Here is an example of a flash card:



## Tips for Fluent Reading

#### Find time to read every day.

Find the best time of day for you to read. Try to read when you are not tired. By reading every day, even for a short period, you will become a more fluent reader.

#### Look for a good place to read.

It is easier to read and study if you are comfortable. Make sure that there is good lighting in your reading area and that you are sitting in a comfortable chair. To make it easier to concentrate, try to read in a place where you won't be interrupted.

#### Use clues in the text to make predictions.

Fluent readers make predictions before and as they read. Use the title, subtitle, pictures, and captions to ask yourself questions about what you are going to read. Find answers to the questions when you read. After reading, think about what you have learned and decide what you need to read next to continue learning.

#### Establish goals before you read.

Before you read a text, think about the purpose of your reading. For example, do you just want to get a general idea of the passage? Or do you need to find specific information? Thinking about what you want to get from the reading will help you decide what reading skills you need to use.

#### Notice how your eyes and head are moving.

Good readers use their eyes, and not their heads, when they read. Moving your head back and forth when reading will make you tired. Practice avoiding head movements by placing your elbows on the table and resting your head in your hands. Do you feel movement as you read? If you do, hold your head still as you read. Also, try not to move your eyes back over a text. You should reread part of a text only when you have a specific purpose for rereading, for example, to make a connection between what you read previously and what you are reading now.

#### Try not to translate.

Translation slows down your reading. Instead of translating new words into your first language, first try to guess the meaning. Use the context (the other words around the new word) and word parts (prefixes, suffixes, and word roots) to help you guess the meaning.



## Read in phrases rather than word by word.

Don't point at each word while you read. Practice reading in phrases—groups of words that go together.

#### Engage your imagination.

Good readers visualize what they are reading. They create a movie in their head of the story they are reading. As you read, try sharing with a partner the kinds of pictures that you create in your mind.

#### Avoid subvocalization.

Subvocalization means quietly saying the words as you read. You might be whispering the words or just silently saying them in your mind. Your eyes and brain can read much faster than you can speak. If you subvocalize, you can only read as fast as you can say the words. As you read, place your finger on your lips or your throat. Do you feel movement? If so, you are subvocalizing. Practice reading without moving your lips.

#### Don't worry about understanding every word.

Sometimes, as readers, we think we must understand the meaning of everything that we read. It isn't always necessary to understand every word in a passage in order to understand the meaning of the passage as a whole. Instead of interrupting your reading to find the meaning of a new word, circle the word and come back to it after you have finished reading.

#### Enjoy your reading.

Your enjoyment of reading will develop over time. Perhaps today you do not like to read in English, but as you read more, you should see a change in your attitude. The more you read in English, the easier it will become. You will find yourself looking forward to reading.

#### Read as much as you can.

The best tip to follow to become a more fluent reader is to read whenever and wherever you can. Good readers read a lot. They read many different kinds of material: newspapers, magazines, textbooks, websites, and graded readers. To practice this, keep a reading journal. Every day, make a list of the kinds of things you read during the day and how long you read each for. If you want to become a more fluent reader, read more!





# Travel and Technology

It wasn't long ago that going on holiday meant visiting or calling a travel agent to book your flights and hotel. Now, technology may be putting these travel agencies out of business. For one, more people are going online to find and compare prices of flights and hotels, and plan their own itineraries, 5 while connecting with other travelers and reading about each others' experiences. The Internet has a wealth of resources so travelers can learn more about their destination, discover local treasures, or uncover any potential problems they could encounter. Here are three travelers who have not looked back since going online:



Geoff, 37

The first thing I do when I'm preparing to travel is to visit traveler-review websites like TripAdvisor. These interactive sites let travelers share their experiences at tourist attractions, restaurants, and hotels. They can give each place a rating, write a review, or discuss them in online forums. Reading the opinions of **genuine** travelers can be much more convincing than any advertisement. On top of that,

reviewers often provide tips, like where to find a money changer in a small town, or which is the best room in a hotel. Also, being able to search for attractions by location, price, or quality rating is a big help because the kind of place I'm looking for depends on whether I'm traveling for work or for leisure. When I travel for work, I focus on comfort and location. But when I'm with my wife and three kids, I always try to get the best value for our money. We also love making personalized travel plans that focus on our interests, such as food and beautiful beaches.

#### Hanna, 24

I used to accompany my family on package trips with tour guides and expensive accommodation, but traveling like that separates you from the local culture. It's not really my style. When I go traveling by myself, I love to stay with local people, so I use websites like Couchsurfing and Airbnb to find people to stay with. These sites help you connect with someone in your

destination city so that you can rent their space or even stay in their **spare** room for free. I find that staying with someone is often more comfortable than staying in a hotel, and it's usually cheaper. Also, by staying with locals, you get to meet new people and can get sightseeing tips about the city you're visiting. I love to experience the culture and not just the tourist attractions. So when I stay with people, I ask them to tell me about cool places they go to, like their favorite cafes, markets, and shops. And by the end of my stay, I've usually made a few friends!

These days, I never leave for a trip without my smartphone. I use apps and the Internet to access maps, airport information, and many other things. I used to take taxis or the subway to get everywhere in a new city. But not only does the cost of these rides **add up**, they're also not a great way to see a city or learn about a new place. With my smartphone, I'm more confident

finding my own way around. I always have access to a map, so I do a lot of walking tours. I don't have to worry about getting lost because I can enter my destination into my phone and it will give me directions, and even re-adjusts the **route** if I make a wrong turn. I've even used smartphone apps to tour museums in New York and London. With the right apps and an Internet connection, a smartphone makes **navigating** the city a breeze!

# Selling India's Rainy Season



In most parts of the world, storm clouds would be greeted with a frown. But in India, it's said that when the monsoon rains come, a billion people smile. Monsoon season, also known as the rainy 5 season, is closely tied to India's economy. The abundant rains bring life to India's farmland, which provides hundreds of millions of jobs to farm workers and helps feed its vast population.

While monsoon season is traditionally a joyful 10 and important time for Indian agriculture, it affects the tourism industry in a very different way. During this time, the number of travelers to India can drop by half. Understandably, very few tourists

want to spend their holiday in the rain. But there has been a government push over the last few years to convince them otherwise:

> that India's rain is to be celebrated and not **shunned**. "Watching the rains is one of the best sightseeing options I can imagine," says journalist Somini Sengupta, a Calcutta native.

Various states have risen to the challenge. Goa (a popular holiday destination near Mumbai) and Kerala in the south have begun offering "monsoon packages." They say the monsoon brings other benefits besides lower off-season

prices. For one, the rain brings with it **lush**, green landscapes. "Goa has beautiful islands, waterfalls, lakes, dams, and wildlife **sanctuaries** that can be enjoyed during the monsoons," says Elvis Gomes, former director of the state's tourism department.

Some of the country's biggest festivals are
also held either at the beginning or end of the
monsoon season. For example, Onam festival, held in Kerala in August or September, is a
ten-day-long celebration of the rich harvest, where people eat, and watch the famous
boat races. In the city of Puri on the eastern coast, the Rath Yatra festival features
colorful parades every evening for 21 days, where statues of deities are carried through the
streets.

India has a long history of monsoon appreciation dating back to the 19th century. **Palaces**were built to honor and enjoy the rains. The most famous of these "monsoon palaces" is Sajjan
Garh Palace in the southern city of Udaipur. It rests on a hill and has viewing areas that offer
beautiful views of the Sajjan Garh Wildlife Sanctuary. These palaces served as summer homes
for royalty but today offer a taste of classic Indian-style luxury. Not to be outdone, modern
resorts have added special **facilities** to attract monsoon visitors. Some have built "water
parks" with connected pools, water slides, and fountains where people can splash around, as
well as open-air cafes where people can drink coffee when it pours. Some luxury hotels even
have private patios next to their guest rooms so that their guests can shower naturally in the rain.

monsoon season following the rains up both the east and west coasts of India. In his book *Chasing the Monsoon*, he describes the unique energy and traditions surrounding the monsoons in different regions and cities. Frater noticed that many people travel to western India during the monsoons seeking physical and spiritual healing. He quotes a local from Mumbai who describes the monsoon as a metaphor for cleansing and rebirth. "The wind drops, it gets very dark, there is terrific thunder and lightning... Suddenly,

the air is very cool and perfumed with flowers. It is a time of rejoicing. And renewal."

Many visitors go to India simply to share in this joyous season. As one Kerala promoter says, "You can feel the magic. The washed streets and fresh leaves seem to smile with you."

# The Color of Style

How do style trends begin? Some people assume style ideas come straight from designers or from large companies like LVMH (owner of luxury brands like Louis Vuitton). Others believe trends are born on the streets in the 5 form of fashionable individuals. In fact, these designers and well-dressed people, whether they know it or not, are partly influenced by an association that is little-known outside the clothes industry—the Color Marketing Group (CMG).



The sole responsibility of CMG is to decide the "hot" colors for the future. This global association is made up of more than 1,100 contributors who research and predict color trends. The data developed by CMG is so influential that it affects not only style. Industries like design and architecture or car manufacturers are also involved, as they need to know what the "in" colors are for their products, like wall paint and new cars. Stylist and color expert Kate Smith says that she thinks of CMG as "an invaluable resource when it comes to understanding the direction for design and color for years to come."

CMG's members are always collecting data, information, and samples that will help inform them about future trends. Participating

designers consider many aspects of culture when surveying color trends, such as movies, music, travel, politics, and the economy. Members of CMG then meet for conferences to compile their findings into a report that designers can use as a guide for future seasons' style. These reports are 30 used by textile manufacturers, where designers and artists create fabrics and materials that feature the predicted tones. Style designers then attend fabric conventions to consider the direction they will take with their designs in the upcoming seasons.



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CMG is not the only group of its kind, however, and other color analysts have come to different conclusions about which colors will be popular in coming years. In 2012, CMG declared *Boyz-N-Berry*, a bold purple, to be its "Color of the Year." In contrast, CMG's main competitor Pantone selected *Tangerine* as its
top color for 2012. A strong red-orange color, Tangerine was chosen for its energy and strength at a time when the economy was down, and many people wanted to cheer up and feel more **optimistic**. "There's the element of encouragement with orange," said
Leatrice Eiseman, executive director of the Pantone Color Institute. "It's building on the ideas of courage and action, that we want to move on to better things."

Of course, color **forecasts** are not always perfect. As



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the great difference between Boyz-N-Berry and Tangerine suggests, predicting color and style trends may be more of an art than a science. Designers may have advice and direction from organizations that study color, but they still need to use their own **intuition** when deciding which advice to follow. In the end, consumer purchases dictate the trends that will **stick**, and it's hard to predict how people will act two years in the future.

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Style blogger Peter Lappin has pointed to some surveys that claim U.S. retailers lose as much as \$200 billion dollars a year because of sales forecast errors. This problem

could result from a number of factors: perhaps designers focused on the wrong trends or there wasn't enough promotion of the trend. Maybe retailers made bad decisions with regard to the trends and styles they were presented with. As Lappin admits, "nobody knows for sure what's going to happen tomorrow, whether it's in economics, politics, or style." But next time you notice an abundance of a certain color on the streets, you'll know it's down to decisions made years in advance by organizations like CMG.

# Reality TV: Good or Bad for Style?

"That's fierce!"

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Does that quote make you think of designer Christian Siriano? Siriano, who made the word "fierce" a wellknown phrase, has become one of the most successful

- stars of reality television since winning the style contest show *Project Runway* in 2008. However, he is one of very few designers to find real success after appearing on a reality show. With so few success stories to speak of, many people are wondering
- if these shows are actually helping designers' careers. What's more, many fashion professionals question if the shows are a good thing for the industry.
- Style reality shows have become very popular 15 among a wide audience, these programs have been running for several seasons, and fans follow each episode and even
- create fan blogs and write in online forums about the show. Supporters of these shows say they see how professionals work, from sketching ideas to choosing fabric to fitting and accessorizing models. These shows are like a backstage pass to a runway show. Jennifer Minnitti, chairwoman of the
- 25 department of style at the Pratt Institute, agrees that such reality shows have stimulated interest in style. As a result of this increased popularity, more

and more students pursue studies in style and design, and these departments in universities are growing ever larger.

- While inspiring students is a good thing, Minnitti points out that some students might be **misled** by reality shows. "You get a lot of students who just want to participate in this program because they want to be on TV, or be a celebrity," says Minnitti. "This is a tough business." Minnitti's concern is that these shows make the clothing industry look glamorous without giving
- a true picture of the amount of work involved. Style consultant Fern Mallis

agrees. She says that reality shows give people the idea that it can be easy to find success and create their own brand; both extremely rare and difficult things to do. While 40 many contestants from these shows do find work in the industry—as designers for clothing brands, costume designers, etc. most do not achieve the level of fame or prestige they are seeking.



The management at clothing brands also seem cautious about working with the shows and their former contestants. Brands such as H&M, Macy's, and Saks Fifth Avenue have sponsored TV shows and have offered representatives from their companies as judges. But very few brands have been willing to put their name alongside that of a reality show contestant. This, you might argue, says a lot about the amount of faith companies have in the

winners of TV programs. Brand managers know that collaborating with

a designer or a celebrity can add a new look to their products, make the brand more appealing to consumers, and sell a lot of clothes. But putting out a new clothing 55 line is risky, as it takes a lot of money to produce

and promote. This is why brands prefer to work with established designers, like Marc Jacobs, or celebrities, such as Simpson, who can draw their fans to the brand.

Major brands have shown that so far they don't believe in the power of reality show contestants. Clothing legend Calvin Klein is among those in the industry who openly do not respect reality shows, and his comments might explain why brand managers hesitate to work with unknown designers. "To really have success

and to really make it you need staying power. That's not an accident. These designers work at it all the time, they never stop," says Klein. "A TV show about style? That's a momentary thing."



# Endangered Species

No animal species<sup>1</sup> can survive **indefinitely** on Earth. Centuries ago, species went extinct from natural causes, for example, they were unable to adapt to bad weather and other difficult conditions. However, animals are now dying out faster than ever because of human activity. It is estimated that, until the 18th century,

one species disappeared from the Earth every four years. By the 19th century, this had increased to one species per year. By 1975, it was 1,000 species per year, and today animals are disappearing at the alarming rate of more than 40,000 species per year.

The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) has created a number of categories that describe the danger level of animal species.

- Species that are completely gone are called extinct, for example, dinosaurs and the dodo.
- Species that only live in zoos or on farms, etc., fall into the category extinct in the wild. One example is the Wyoming toad.
- A species is labeled critically endangered when its numbers are dangerously low. This means it is in **imminent** danger of dying out completely and needs protection in order to survive. The Siberian tiger and the snow leopard are two examples.

- Species that have a high, but not immediate, risk 20 of dying out are simply labeled endangered. The giant panda is a famous example.
  - Wyoming toad A vulnerable species is in less trouble than an endangered one, but its numbers are still markedly declining. The cheetah and the African elephant are vulnerable species.
  - Animal species that are considered of least concern aren't particularly endangered and have high numbers of individuals.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> A **species** is a group of animals or plants that are very similar and can reproduce together.

There are many factors that can cause an animal or plant species to become endangered, and one big one is the destruction of their habitats. Deforestation and soil, air, and water pollution are usually the main **culprits**. For example, the population of critically endangered Sumatran orangutans is now less than 10,000 on their home island of Sumatra, Indonesia, due to deforestation and farming.

Another cause of endangerment is from humans **exploiting** wild animals. Uncontrolled hunting of whales in the last century, for example, resulted in many whale species becoming critically endangered. The high demand for animal parts stems from their use in certain foods or medicines or their value as decorative objects. For example, the ivory tusks of elephants are used to make jewelry, and the

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price is high enough that people risk being arrested and jailed to go after these animals.

Introducing a non-native species to an environment can also cause species endangerment. A native species is one that develops naturally in a particular area and has done so for a long time. A non-native species might be introduced into a new environment by humans, either intentionally or by accident. The brown tree snake, unknowingly brought by cargo ships<sup>2</sup> stopping at Guam, has managed to kill off 10



- of the 11 species of birds native to the island's forests. In Florida, large pet snakes such as the anaconda and the python have been released into the large Everglades swamp. The snakes have thrived in their new environment, and now compete with and may soon **overwhelm** the swamp's alligators.
- Organizations such as the World Wildlife Fund and the IUCN try to raise awareness of threatened animals and plants. These organizations collaborate with government agencies to save threatened or endangered species and to make new laws that will protect them. But to really protect plant and animal species now and in the future, the public needs to be educated on the value of keeping these species alive.

## Bring Back the Woolly Mammoth?



Scientists estimate that throughout the course of Earth's history, more than a billion different species of animals and insects have existed. Today, there are only about 30-50 million species left, according to the World Animal Foundation. That means that for every species living on Earth today, 20 more are already extinct. Scientists study extinct species to get a better understanding of the past. In addition to studying what these

species might have been like when they were alive, some scientists are interested in the possibility of seeing some of them walk the Earth again.



the New Zealand moa

There are a number of serious proposals to try to **revive** extinct species. Some animals on this list include: the woolly mammoth (an elephant-like creature that wandered the plains of Siberia), the moa (a giant flightless bird from New Zealand), the thylacine (also known as the Tasmanian

tiger because of the dark stripes down its back), and the bucardo (a mountain goat from Spain). These animals had very little in common and in most cases lived eras apart. The woolly mammoth, for example, died many thousands of years ago while the bucardo became extinct only around the year 2000. But all these species lived at the same time as humans, and humans have been largely responsible for their destruction. So it seems somehow fitting that we are now thinking of reviving them.

Scientists have proposed reviving an extinct species using two possible methods. In the first method, sex cells (sperm or eggs) are obtained from the extinct animal and are used to fertilize sex cells of a closely related living relative in a laboratory. For example,

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sperm from a woolly mammoth could be used to fertilize an egg from a modern-day elephant. The fertilized egg would then be placed in the live female elephant where it would live and grow until it is ready to be born. The second method involves a type of cloning. In cloning, the DNA of one individual replaces the DNA of another. In the woolly mammoth example, scientists could **inject** DNA from a mammoth into an egg cell from an elephant. The cloned egg cell would then be placed into a living elephant and allowed to develop in the same way as a fertilized egg.

- But some scientists believe species
  revival will never happen because both
  methods are problematic. One of the
  major challenges is how to obtain enough
  high-quality DNA from an extinct species
  to **conduct** an experiment. While it
  - is theoretically possible under ideal conditions to preserve genetic material for thousands of years, these conditions rarely occur in real life. For example,



Dolly the sheep was the first animal to ever be cloned.

- researchers have obtained a number of samples of mammoth DNA, but none have been usable. And the cloning process presents its own problems. Scientists have been able to clone only a few species of animals, and most cloned creatures are **frail** and don't live very long.
- And there is a final, ethical consideration. Even if we learn how to reproduce an example of an extinct species, that individual could never have a normal life. Its natural environment is most likely gone and it would have no parents to show it how to behave as a member of its species. So the animal would remain a curiosity and probably live out its life in a zoo. People question whether it would be ethical to revive one of nature's creatures for such a purpose.
- Only time will tell if scientists manage to carry out their ambitious plans. Even if
  they manage to overcome the scientific problems, they may face **opposition** from
  governments or society. Some even feel it might be more **worthwhile** for us to
  focus our efforts on conservation and take care of existing species, so they don't
  also go the way of the woolly mammoth.



10 or by conserving the wildlife. Countries are slowly recognizing that it is possible to make money while preserving their natural resources.

Costa Rica has been leading the ecotourism movement for some time, and was voted the most popular ecotourism destination by TripAdvisor.com in April 2012. 15 It developed the Certification for Sustainable Tourism (CST) program in 1999, which was then used by the United Nations World Tourism Organization as the model for the rest of Latin America. Thanks to its conservation efforts, over 25 percent of Costa Rica's land is covered in lush national parks. Its tourism industry generates over a billion dollars annually and provides jobs to thousands of people.

Unfortunately, people in the industry sometimes exploit the "ecotourism" label in their drive for profit. This brand of ecotourism isn't always conducted in the most responsible way, and may damage the very environment it seeks to protect. One concern is that the overwhelming number of visitors to these natural



places (especially in the high season) has a negative effect on the ecosystem. Ecotourists tend to seek out places with the rarest animals and plants; even if they take care not to disturb the environment, their presence could put pressure on the most frail of living things. Another problem is the interaction between animals and humans. At one national park in Costa

Rica, wild monkeys feed on garbage left by the visitors and even aggressively steal food from tourists.

- Controlling abuses isn't easy, either. In developing countries where salaries aren't high, 40 corruption can lead officials to tolerate ecological damage. For example, a large resort facility, normally not allowed near a sanctuary, might be allowed if the company bribes (gives money to) certain people in the government. Limited resources are another issue—areas of forests and beaches that would require an army to protect are often watched by just a few employees.
- While tourists can have a negative impact on ecosystems, the same areas might have been totally destroyed by industries such as farming, logging, or mining if the ecotourism industry did not exist. Tour guides can also be educators who train people to love and care for the environment. By visiting these beautiful rain forests and seeing rare
  - 50 animals, visitors get a sense of their value and will hopefully take these lessons back with them to their home countries.



- It is easy to be critical of the ecotourism industry, but it is important to be positive as
  - 55 well. Ecotourism can never be "pure"—we can't expect zero negative effects on the ecosystem. It is also unrealistic to think that humans won't

### THE GLOBALIZATION OF FASHION

- Walk down any shopping street in a big city and you'll see big names such as Zara, H&M, Gap, or Nike. A dress bought from one of these stores will be exactly
  - the same as in another store halfway around the world. Indeed, fashion is one of the most globalized industries, with giant retailers who can create new designs, send them to be manufactured,
  - and then distributed to stores around the world—all with the click of a mouse or a simple phone call.
- For consumers in developed countries, globalization means an abundance of choice. This is the era of "fast fashion," where designs can go from the design board to factories to stores in two weeks. It is also "fast" in the sense that it takes
  - less time for trends to come and go. Historically, the price of clothes has never been lower and this, combined with the ever-changing stock, encourages people to follow the latest fashions and change their wardrobes more frequently.
- However, the speed and low price of fashion can come at a cost. For consumers, it may result in poor quality fabrics and badly-made clothes that fall apart after

  being worn several times. Then there is a much heavier cost—one that involves the people who actually make the clothes. Many big multinational companies do not manufacture their own goods, but sign contracts with manufacturers to produce them. These manufacturers then source and engage factories in developing countries for tasks like sewing and cutting. Because poverty is high, these factories can exploit the workers and pay them wages that are as low as 23 cents an hour.
- A government investigation into factories manufacturing Zara clothes revealed that it cost Inditex (the company that owns Zara) about \$1.14 to manufacture a pair of jeans selling at \$126. This \$1.14 doesn't go straight to the worker who makes

the clothes, but is divided among the parties involved in the entire production process. Although the minimum wage in Brazil is \$344, these factory workers only earned between \$156 and \$290 a month. Renato Bignami, who led the investigation, said: "They work 16 or even 18 hours a day. It is extremely exhausting work, from Monday to Saturday, sometimes even Sunday depending on demand."





- But supporters of this globalized labor process argue that retail companies are not the main culprits since, without them, many people in developing countries would be without a job. They also feel that it's impossible for companies to monitor all the factories that work for them, and that responsibility to enforce labor laws should lie with the government. Consumers are also responsible, even if unintentionally. By choosing to buy cheaper clothes, they force brands to lower their prices to compete against each other, which in turn forces manufacturers to drive wages down.
- The hope is that consumers are able to use their spending power to convince companies to take a more ethical route, for example, by giving contracts to manufacturers with good track records in how they treat their employees. In the late 1990s, sports brand Nike came under pressure when campaigners exposed what went on in the factories making its products. This included child labor, unsafe working conditions including exposure to dangerous chemicals, low pay, and very long working hours. All the negative publicity,



protesting against Nike

including a long-running campaign to boycott the brand, finally forced Nike to take action, for example, by conducting regular factory inspections.

### ANIMAL SUCCESS STORIES

In 1973, the United States government passed into law the Endangered Species Act (ESA). Its three major goals were: 1. to protect plants and animals from extinction by listing them as endangered; 2. to preserve the habitat of these species; 3. to help populations of listed species recover. Because of these conservation efforts, many animals have been brought back from near extinction. Here are three such success stories.

### **Bald eagle**

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It is fitting that we begin with the story of the bald eagle, the national symbol of the United States. There was an abundance of bald eagles in North America before the arrival of Europeans, numbering an estimated half a million birds. By 1963, however, the population had dropped to fewer than 1,000. Hunting was certainly a major factor in this decline, as was the destruction of habitat. But the biggest factor was DDT—a chemical widely used in insect sprays. It had a damaging effect on the eagles' eggs, making their shells so thin so that they broke easily and exposed the frail baby birds inside which die soon after.

The 1972 ban on DDT was the single most important factor in the revival of the bald eagle. Being listed as an endangered species gave the birds additional protection. Bald eagle populations are now carefully monitored, and baby eagles are raised under human protection later to be released into the wild. Thanks to these efforts, the number of eagles in the United States has grown markedly and the birds can be seen in many national parks. In August 2007, bald eagles were removed from the ESA list.

### **Grizzly bear**

Another classic symbol of North American wildlife is the grizzly bear. Before the Europeans arrived, more than 50,000 grizzlies wandered the American West. Today, due to hunting and habitat destruction, that number is closer to 1,000.



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Furthermore, because grizzly bears have babies at a very slow rate, it takes many years for the population to grow.

Most of the grizzly bears in the United States, excluding Alaska, live in Yellowstone and Glacier National Parks.

As grizzlies are still protected by the ESA, hunting them is illegal. As bear

populations grow, it becomes very important to prevent encounters between humans and bears: 20 to 40 bears are killed each year to protect the safety of humans. People living in grizzly bear habitats are encouraged not to leave garbage lying around in case bears are attracted to the smell, and parks put up signs warning people not to stray off the path. Visitors are also warned not to alarm any bears they encounter.



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### **Gray wolf**

Finally, the gray or timber wolf's story is one of the most compelling tales of American wildlife. Traditionally shunned because people fear them and consider them pests for killing livestock, gray wolves have been shot, trapped, and poisoned, even in nature reserves. By the time the gray wolf was declared a protected species in 1973, only a

few hundred remained in small pockets of the country. Today, the gray wolf population has been revived in some of its former habitats, like Yellowstone National Park, due to strong conservation efforts. They have also started returning to places like Washington and Idaho. The gray wolf is now listed as a species of Least Concern by IUCN.

In 2006, the United States government declared May 11 to be Endangered Species Day—a day devoted to raising awareness of endangered species. With such positive steps toward educating people on the importance of conservation, there's reason to be optimistic about the future of endangered animals in the U.S.



### What Does a Million Dollars Buy?

- When asked the question "What would you do with a million dollars?" most people tend to give similar answers: "Quit my job," "Buy my dream house," or "Go traveling." People often think that having a million dollars would make all their dreams come true. **In reality**, a million dollars may not really be that much money.
  - Twenty years ago, it might have been possible to **fulfil** these dreams. However, things are not so easy today.
- In most industrialized¹ countries, prices for everything from food to transport to university fees have steadily increased over the years. Housing prices in particular have risen greatly. The main reason is that the population has increased—becoming very **dense** in certain areas—but there are fewer homes available for sale or rent.
  - For example, in the U.S., the average price of a new home in 1990 was \$149,800. The average price in 2010 was \$272,900. With increases

like that, you can see why owning **property** is considered a good long-term **investment**.

Housing in city centers also costs more than ever before. People used to move from the city center to the outer city neighborhoods or suburbs to escape overcrowding and noise.

Today, many are moving back because they want to be closer to their workplace. Since space is limited in these areas, supply has not caught up with rising demand, and prices have gone up a result. For example, it is nearly impossible to find a place in London's expensive Mayfair district, or Manhattan in New York City, for a million dollars. Even countries that traditionally have a lower cost of living, like India or Brazil, have seen property

prices rise dramatically. A 2,000 square foot

(186 square meter) apartment in Mumbai's southern neighborhoods can cost more than \$3 million—the same as a two-bedroom flat in central London.

**Inflation** is another important reason for the rise in the cost of living. Over the last 150 years, as prices have gone up, the value of money has gone down, so we now need more money to buy things. In 1913, for example, \$50,000 had about as

much buying power as \$1 million does today. Of course, people now earn more money than they did 150 years ago, but they also

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spend more on **necessities** such as food, medicine, and housing. Due to this increased cost of living and a tendency for younger generations to spend more, people are actually saving less than ever before.

- In order to live well after you retire, you should begin saving as early as possible. Experts suggest that after you stop working, you will need 70 to 75 percent of your **salary** to live on every month. In other words, if you make \$3,000 per month while working, you will need between \$2,100 and \$2,250 per month to live on
  - during retirement. This calculation assumes that you have no mortgage<sup>2</sup> on a house to continue paying, or other major expenses like your children's university education. However, more retired people now rent their housing because they can't afford to buy a home, so they will pay more in housing costs over time. People also have to spend more on health care because they live longer; many
  - 50 people in developed countries now live into their 80s or 90s.
- Due to increased demand for housing, higher inflation, and a longer life expectancy, a million dollars may not be enough to live on. Of course, where you live and how long you live will influence how far a million dollars can go. To be able to retire early, travel the world, and build your dream home, you may have to be a millionaire many times over!

Every week, millions of dollars are spent, and won, on lottery tickets. With jackpots hitting hundreds of millions of dollars, many lottery winners suddenly find themselves with much more money than they're used to. Many will have enough to purchase a new car, buy a luxury house, take a holiday and quit working—all within 5 a short space of time. These "lucky" few, however, may end up with more problems than they had before they struck it rich. According to financial planner Steven Goldbart, two out of three winners spend all their winnings within five years.

Newly **affluent** lottery winners are actually in quite a **tricky** situation, so much so that lottery organizers employ counselors to help them. These counselors encourage winners to get advice from financial experts, such as accountants, about how best to invest their earnings. The counselors also help winners to understand how their lives may change for the better—and possibly for the worse. Many lottery winners are sensible when managing their new wealth; some, however, do not use their money **wisely** and end up getting into various **unforeseen** difficulties. Take a look at the fortunes of two very different lottery winners.

Michael Carroll is an example of what can happen to lottery winners if they don't manage their money carefully. When Carroll was 19 years old, he won £10 million in England's National Lottery. At the time, Carroll was working as a garbage collector, and the money changed his life. Three months after winning the

20



lottery, he bought a home in a small town and turned the backyard into a 24-hour racetrack. The constant noise and dust upset his neighbors. He also purchased several luxury vehicles but was stopped for driving a brand new BMW without license plates or insurance. He was **banned** from driving for six months. This wasn't Carroll's first encounter with the law - he was frequently



arrested for drug possession and other crimes, and was jailed for nine month in 2006 for violent behavior. Upon his release from prison, Carroll applied for loans to make the payments on properties he had bought and to continue funding his **extravagant** lifestyle. In just eight years, Carroll had spent all his winnings. It was reported in 2010 that he was trying to get his old job as a garbage collector back.



After winning almost \$29 million in a North Carolina lottery in 2009, Billy and Jeff Wilson say they have learned a lot about managing money. When people found out that the father and son had won so much money, the family had to leave their hometown to avoid

people asking them for financial help. Billy, the elder Wilson, stopped working but likes to believe that winning the lottery hasn't really changed them as people. He said: "We live around a bunch of millionaires and some of them are the most miserable people on Earth. Just because you have money doesn't make you any better than anyone else and sometimes it seems like they forgot that." His son Jeff says he just enjoys hanging out with friends and fishing. Thanks to the sensible way in which they handled their lottery money, the Wilsons are set to enjoy their winnings for a long, long time.

If you should happen to be lucky enough to win a lottery, here are a few simple rules that financial advisors recommend following.

- Meet with an accountant or other financial advisor.
- Pay all **debts**, such as home mortgages, car loans, and credit card bills.
  - Calculate how much money will be needed to live on every year and then invest the extra money.
  - Hand in your resignation only when you know you really don't need the job anymore.

# **Wedding Customs**

Marriage is a part of nearly every culture in the world, but marriage traditions vary greatly from place to place.

#### The Wedding Dress

5 In many countries, it is **customary** for the bride to wear a white dress as a symbol of her innocence. The tradition of wearing a



special white dress for the wedding ceremony started over 150 years ago in 1840, when Queen Victoria married in white. Before that, brides wore all sorts of colors (even black!) and most could not afford to buy a dress that they would only wear once. Modern brides are more fortunate: dresses are still white but are now available in a variety of styles and fabrics. Many women even have their dresses specially designed and tailored. Not all cultures celebrate with white, however. In certain Asian countries and in the Middle East, red and orange are 15 considered symbols of joy and happiness. In Asia it is not uncommon for the bride and groom to change clothes several times as the ceremony progresses.

#### The Rings

In many cultures, couples exchange rings, usually made of gold or silver, during the marriage ceremony. The circular shape of the ring is symbolic of the couple's eternal union. In Brazil, it is traditional to have the rings engraved with the bride's name on the groom's ring and vice versa. In the United States, England,

Canada, and France, the wedding ring is usually worn on the third finger of the left hand because it was once believed that a vein 25 ran directly from this finger to the heart. But wedding and engagement rings aren't always jewelry for the fingers. In traditional Hindu relationships, the man gives the woman a bichiya—a ring worn on the toe—as a symbol



The groom puts a bichiya on the bride's foot, which is decorated with henna (a natural and temporary dye).

#### **Flowers**

Flowers play an important role in most weddings. Roses are said to be the flowers of love, and because roses usually bloom in June (in the

- Northern Hemisphere<sup>1</sup>), this has become the most popular month for weddings in many countries. Ivy is also used in wedding bouquets because in early Greek times it was thought to be a sign of everlasting love. The flower bouquets of some
- Middle Eastern brides contain Artemisia—a bitter herb—to symbolize that the marriage will survive

- both good times and bad. In Thai weddings, the mothers of the bride and groom lay flowers on the shoulders of the couple to bring happiness and luck to their marriage. Flower garlands<sup>2</sup> are also exchanged in addition to rings to represent the beauty of marriage and life. After the wedding ceremony, it is customary in many countries for the bride to throw her bouguet into a crowd of well-wishers.
- many countries for the bride to throw her bouquet into a crowd of well-wishers, usually her single female friends. It is said that the person who catches the bouquet will be the next one to marry.

#### **Gifts**

- In Chinese cultures, wedding guests give gifts of money to the newlyweds in small red envelopes. Money is also an **appropriate** gift at Korean and Japanese weddings. Not all cultures, however, give money. In many Western countries such as the United Kingdom, wedding guests give the bride and groom household items that they may need for their new home. In Russia, rather than receiving gifts,
- the bride and groom provide gifts to their guests instead. In Scotland, a week before the wedding ceremony, the bride's mother may invite the guests to her house and show off all the wedding gifts received, unwrapped, each with a card that has the giver's name on it.

Today, many couples choose to **integrate** wedding traditions from different cultures around the world. With so many interesting practices to choose from, people can create the perfect occasion on their most special day.

# Travel Diary: Yanshuei Fireworks Festival By Michael Liu

I just returned from the most amazing experience of my life at the Yanshuei Fireworks Festival!

After spending some time with family in Taipei celebrating Chinese New Year, I'm staying the weekend with friends in Tainan, in the south of Taiwan. Last night my old 5 roommate Lin invited me to a fireworks festival in the city of Yanshuei. Since we were going to a fireworks festival, I assumed that I should pack a blanket and maybe some snacks for a picnic while we watched the fireworks. Naturally, I was surprised when Lin gave me an old sweatshirt, gloves, a towel, and a motorcycle helmet. When I asked why I needed these old clothes he smiled and said, "You'll see."

10 According to legend, in the 17th century a terrible plague had been making the people of Yanshuei ill for years and no one could find a cure. When some citizens suggested that perhaps there were evil spirits in the town, the people decided to ask the war god, Guan Yu, to come and drive away the evil spirits. The people impressed Guan Yu with a huge fireworks display and in return, he drove out the spirits that had been plaguing 15 the town. Today the fireworks festival is an annual event to honor and thank Guan Yu.

When we arrived in Yanshuei, we saw many preparations being made for the festival, which starts after sunset and goes on all night. Near the center of town, we were greeted by the sight of large walls with many holes and open boxes facing in all directions. Lin told me that the local word for these walls means "beehive," and that they would be filled with 20 fireworks for the celebration. I suddenly realized that I needed the extra clothes, gloves and helmet to protect myself from the fireworks! I looked around and noticed workers stuffing the beehives with fireworks of all kinds. Lin could see what I was thinking and he said that many people are injured by fireworks at this festival every year. I soon saw that

a few participants wear very little protection from the fireworks and receive many burns to the skin.

His advice was confusing, but when a man started to light the beehive everyone started hopping, so I joined in.

Moments later, rockets were screaming, booming and popping in all directions. Fireworks collided with my helmet and bounced off my body. I closed my eyes and all I could smell was smoke from the explosions. It was over in a few seconds, but it felt much longer. I realized that the hopping was to shake off any fireworks that might get stuck and burn

40 you. My heart was racing<sup>2</sup> and I could feel a big smile on my face as I caught my breath and brushed myself off. That beehive was the first of many and each one seemed more amazing than the last.

Now I understood the name "beehive" the sound of the fireworks became a constant buzzing in my ears.

# The "Lost World" of South America

- The world is far less a mystery than it was a century ago, but it still holds a few locations that baffle scientists and researchers. Early explorers spoke of mysterious mountains towering above South America's jungle. Such stories inspired Arthur Conan Doyle to write The Lost World, a novel set in an isolated
- 5 place still inhabited by dinosaurs. The dinosaurs were fiction ... but the mountains are real.
- The mountains are called tepuis, or "house 2 of the gods," in the language of the local Pémon. Rising thousands of meters into the
  - 10 sky over the jungles of Guyana, Brazil, and Venezuela, these are dramatic sandstone structures (called mesas by geologists) with flat tops and steep sides. Tepuis are so **remote** that they have prevented researchers
  - 15 from exploring them fully—they truly are among the last unexplored places on Earth.





- The flat summits, ranging from a few square kilometers to dozens and even 3 hundreds of square kilometers, used to be connected. Some scientists even believe that these tepuis have life forms from the ancient super continent1
  - 20 known as Gondwana, which may have included what we know today as South America, Africa, Antarctica, Australia, and other land masses. "A few people have been there, but really not a lot, considering what they are—among the oldest formations in the world," Jesus Rivas, a biology professor, said. "They are like a place where time stopped. In the fauna<sup>2</sup> you can see South America evolving for
  - 25 the last 300 million years."
- The high altitude and the ancient age of the tepuis make them extremely interesting to biologists. They are frequently described as "islands in the sky,"

covered in tropical greenery that supports a wide range of wildlife. Indeed, many of the species that live on top of the tepuis are found nowhere else on the planet. But because they are so hard to reach, scientists have only begun to scratch the surface of the enormous diversity on and around the tepuis.

studies on tree frogs exclusive to these tepuis showed that they had climbed up slowly over a few million years. Unfortunately, until further studies are conducted, scientists can only **speculate**.

People who want to visit these tepuis can arrange special tours, but it will require enormous effort to get there. To make a comparison, Angel Falls in Venezuela—the tallest waterfall in the world—is probably the most popular tourist destination

45 in the tepui region. However, the base of the falls can only be reached after flying

into the jungle and hiking for hours.

When the creators of *Up* (a movie which featured the tepuis) visited to get a feel of the place, they chose Roraima—

the "easiest" of the tepuis to climb.
Bob Peterson, one of the climbers, said: "It was like your worst nightmare. It was like a six- or seven-hour climb to the top, and I had on way too much gear. When we got
to the top, we had to hike across uneven

# Is "Spontaneous Human Combustion" Possible?

- It happens something like this. Someone finds a badly burnt body in a poorly ventilated room. The body is sitting in a chair or lying on a bed or the floor. The



- This phenomenon is actually nothing new. A 1763 book by Frenchman Jonas Dupont with the title De Incendiis Corporis Humani Spontaneis describes in detail a 25 number of cases of SHC. A century later, Charles Dickens used SHC to kill off one of the characters in his
  - more recent unexplained deaths have 30 helped to keep the theory of SHC alive. One of the latest cases was of Michael Faherty, a 76-year-old man who was found burned to death in his home in Galway, Ireland, on

novel Bleak House. A number of



Krook dies of SHC in the novel Bleak House.



22 December 2010. Police arrived to find mostly ashes, with his head near an empty fireplace. The room was undamaged by the fire. After a thorough investigation, the coroner recorded Mr. Flaherty's death as a case of "spontaneous human combustion."

People have tried to explain these 40 mysterious deaths in various ways. Some have said that SHC can be set off by a build-up of electricity or gases within the body. The most reasonable explanation seems to be the "wick" or 45 "candle" theory. This says that, under certain circumstances, the human body can function as sort of an inside-out candle. That is, the fabric in a person's



The "wick" theory is one of the explanations for SHC.

- clothing acts like the wick, and the fat in a person's body like the wax in the 50 candle. A spark from a nearby source could set off a small fire and the burning clothes would cause a person's body fat to melt, adding fuel to the fire. In a poorly ventilated room, the body can burn for hours and cause the kind of damage seen in many of the supposed SHC cases. In this scenario, the combustion is not "spontaneous" at all and is always caused by some external fire source.
- 55 In a recent experiment, the criminologist Dr. John de Haan put the wick theory to the test. De Haan wrapped a dead cow (chosen because the body fat of a cow is similar to that of a human) in a blanket, poured gasoline over it, set it on fire and then let it burn in a badly ventilated room. After burning for several hours, the body of the cow was reduced to ashes, much like the bodies of many supposed SHC victims.
- 60 De Haan's experiment did not persuade everyone that the wick theory explains SHC. Some believe there are still too many unanswered questions in many of the cases. What about the situations where no external source of the fire was found or where victims have burst into flame in front of witnesses? Until scientists come up with a theory that explains all of these circumstances, many will likely continue to believe in the possibility of spontaneous human combustion.

# **America's Biggest Lottery Winner**

- One day in December 2002, Jack Whittaker decided to buy a lottery ticket at a small store in West Virginia. The 55-year-old didn't really need to as he was already a successful and affluent businessman. But Whittaker played the lottery that day because the prize was truly a fortune—\$314 million. The next morning he learned he had won it all—the largest lottery win in the history of the United States at that time.
- Whittaker soon surprised everyone with his generosity. He bought property and a car for a worker at the store where he bought the winning ticket. He shared 10 percent of his money with his church. He promised to set up a charitable organization to care for the poor of West Virginia. He seemed humble, saying he'd invest his money wisely and continue to work at his company and "answer his own phone."
- In reality, Whittaker was soon to experience the difficulties that tend to accompany a lottery win. People would wait for him to drop by his favorite store, and then they would beg him for money by telling him sad stories of illnesses and bad luck. Whittaker had to

hire three people just to open letters asking him for money. "I don't have any friends," he said in a newspaper interview. "Every friend that I've had, practically, has wanted to borrow money or something and of course, once they borrow money from you, you can't be friends anymore."

It is also very hard to stay sensible when you have so much money. Whittaker reportedly grew extravagant and starting flashing his cash around. While drinking in a local club, he boasted of having \$500,000 in cash in a briefcase in his car. He also started to make frequent trips to casinos for gambling, and witnesses said he became a troublemaker at these places, causing problems and growing angry when he was refused a request or banned from entering.

Whittaker loved his granddaughter, Brandi, immensely-he said that she was "his world." After winning, Whittaker treated his granddaughter to whatever she wanted; he bought her a new car and paid for her to meet Nelly. According to Brandi's friend, she had a constant supply of money; it wasn't unusual for her to receive \$5,000 in one day from her grandfather. With such money, her lifestyle gradually changed for the worse as she started to use illegal drugs with her friends. 35 Her car was full of trash and money—there

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was so much of it that bills would occasionally fly out the window, according to another friend.

6 On December 4, 2003, Brandi disappeared. When they didn't hear from her over the next five days, the Whittakers called the police. Soon after, Brandi's body was found. She had died from an overdose<sup>1</sup> of illegal

drugs.

# THAT UNIQUE JAPANESE HOLIDAY CALLED . . . CHRISTMAS!

- Christmas is such a popular holiday that it's no surprise that the Japanese celebrate it as well. To the Western person who visits Japan at the end of the year, many sights and sounds are familiar: the Santas in ads, the big displays and the Christmas music in the stores, the lights on the houses, stockings stuffed with toys, and decorated trees.
- But look a bit closer and you begin to realize that the Japanese interpretation of Christmas is something rather different. For one thing, Christmas is more of a fun start to the holidays rather than the main event. In Japan, the most important holiday of the season is New Year's Day, which comes one week later. New Year is the big traditional holiday when family and friends get together. In fact, Christmas is not officially a holiday at all—most people have
  - officially a holiday at all—most people have to work that day unless it happens to fall on a weekend. As a result, people celebrate on Christmas Eve.

What do the Japanese do on Christmas Eve? Often they go out for dinner at a fancy restaurant. This custom has become very popular, and most good restaurants are fully

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
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- 20 booked for that evening. It is the ideal time for couples to go out for a special evening, where they dress up, give each other presents, and enjoy a delicious meal. Christmas has become associated with happiness.
- The food is an important part of the Christmas celebrations. Japanese do not usually eat roast turkey or baked meat on
  - 25 Christmas. They are more likely to eat fried or teriyaki chicken, fried potatoes, cheese-stuffed wonton, or even pizza. The favorite dessert is "Christmas cake," which hardly exists in the West. It is a light, not very sweet cake covered with whipped cream and fruit such as strawberries, sometimes with a plastic Santa Claus for decoration
- 30 on top. Stores everywhere compete to sell their own unique cakes in the days leading up to Christmas.
- As in the West, gift-giving is a big part of the holiday, but it takes on its own character in Japan. On their big night out, couples may give each other flowers, cute stuffed toys, or rings and other jewelry. Within the family, parents may give presents to



their young children, although it's usually not vice versa. The idea here is that the gifts come from Santa Claus, so it only makes sense to give them while the children are still young enough to believe in Santa. It is customary to give presents called *oseibo* to bosses and colleagues, to teachers, or to other people outside the immediate circle of friends and family. These gifts function as a way of showing appreciation to people who have performed some type of service for you.


# NATURAL MYSTERIES

Advances in science and technology may have helped us solve many natural mysteries, but there are some that still puzzle scientists. Keep reading for three natural events that science has yet to fully explain.

Animal Migration
5 Migration has fascinated humans for centuries. Ancient civilizations puzzled over why large numbers of animals would disappear and reappear at certain times of the year. Many animal species make annual journeys to faraway lands, usually to find food, warmer weather, or places to breed. Distances travelled are often vast. For example, the monarch 10 butterfly flies between 2,000 to 4,500 kilometers (or more) from the U.S. and Canada to forests in central Mexico. There, they hibernate and

How an insect weighing as much as a paper clip can complete such a long journey is one thing. What's more mystifying is how these animals 15 even manage to get to their locations, especially when they've never been taught to do so. The biologist Rupert Sheldrake noted, "Baby green turtles that have hatched on the beaches of Ascension Island, in the middle of the Atlantic, find their way across the ocean to the ancestral<sup>1</sup> feeding grounds off the Brazilian coast. Years later, when the

The main theory is that these migrating animals navigate using the sun, moon and stars, a magnetic sense, or the sense of smell. But heavenly bodies are not always visible, and the Earth's magnetic field is known to be very unreliable. Also, how would an animal smell its destination from such a distance? It seems many of these creatures just know their way by sheer intuition.

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#### Raining Fish and Frogs

In January 2012, residents of a town in Agusandel Sur, the Philippines, got the shock of their lives 35 when it started raining fish. Many thought the world was coming to an end. But they were just witnesses to a rare phenomenon that has been recorded throughout history and all over the world. People insist there is a simple explanation: strong winds traveling over water may sometimes pick up small items or animals such as fish or frogs before depositing them a few kilometers on.

However, in Departmento de Yoro of Honduras, it has been raining fish for years and no one has figured out how or why this happens. Every May or June, a heavy rain lasting up to three hours leaves the streets with small fish, many still flapping about. A National Geographic team, which documented the "rainfall" in the 1970s, determined that the fish were all of the same species but were not found anywhere around the area. It is also exceptionally rare to have it occur in the same place twice. Since 1998, the city of Yoro has even organized a festival around this called, appropriately, "The Rain Of Fish Festival"!



#### **Ball Lightning**

For centuries, people have reported seeing strange glowing balls of light appear during thunderstorms. Called ball lightning, these tennis- or even beach ball-sized spheres typically glow, spin, hiss, bounce, and float.

Graham K. Hubler, a physicist who studies ball lightning, 55 describes an encounter when he was 16 years old."It's extraordinary - you're so startled that you remember it for the rest of your life," he said. "It drifted along a few feet above the ground, but when it came inside [the pavilion] it dropped down to the ground and skittered<sup>2</sup> 60 along the floor."

For years, scientists could not explain the phenomenon. But a pair of Brazilian scientists may have finally solved it by creating ball lightning in a lab in 2007. The pair

suggested that when lightning strikes a surface, like the Earth's silica-rich soil, a vapor or gas is formed. 60 This silicon<sup>3</sup> vapor then combines with oxygen in the air and slowly burns. Energy from this chemical reaction causes the resulting ball of electricity to zoom around.







If you're a **pronator**, your ankle rolls inward as you run. This means when your heel hits the ground, the foot moves to the inside as it goes forward.

If you're a **supinator**, your ankle rolls to the outside. The outside of the foot is favored as it moves forward. If you're a **neutral** runner, your foot and ankle land right in the middle. The foot travels in a straight line as it moves forward.



In recent years, the growing trend of barefoot running has started a debate among athletes and doctors about the possible health benefits of running with very light sandals 5 or no shoes at all. Barefoot running has gained popularity among both casual and

competitive athletes. Some athletes say that running barefoot has helped them cure or avoid injuries; others claim that running barefoot has improved their running form and race times. Opponents, however, say that there is no scientific or medical proof that

barefoot running is safer or better than wearing traditional running shoes.

Researchers point out that many of the world's best long distance running cultures—the Tarahumara Indians of Mexico and the Marathon Monks of Enryaku Temple in Japan, for example run either barefoot or in thin sandals and don't often suffer leg injuries. These same experts note that certain injuries that are common to shoe-wearing athletes are rare among barefoot running cultures, especially back and knee issues.

Barefoot running supporters believe that going shoeless strengthens foot and calf muscles, improves **balance**, reduces the shock of hitting the ground, and actually makes some runners faster. Researchers have noted that running

barefoot encourages runners to land more on the front of the foot—the forefoot or ball of the foot—rather than on the heel, which is what most people do when they run in shoes. This causes a smaller part of the foot to come to a sudden stop when the foot first lands, allowing the natural spring-like motion of the foot and leg to **absorb** any

20

further shock. By contrast, the "heel striking" style of running by most runners in shoes
is said to put stress on leg joints and the back.

- A 2012 study compared runners wearing shoes and running barefoot. The study documented a six percent improvement in energy usage when running barefoot.

  Because runners without shoes take shorter strides and may have different contact with the ground, they use less oxygen and feel less tired. According to the study, this level of energy saving is equal to what can be achieved after six weeks of training in running shoes.
- Despite this, there is still no **clear-cut** data, and the debate about barefoot running is alive and well. Doctors and coaches have noted that people who normally run in shoes have "forgotten" how to run without shoes, and **urge** athletes not to **rush** into barefoot running. **Persistent** pain in the heels, knees, or lower back might be signs that your running form needs adjusting. For those interested in trying barefoot running, here are some precautions and practices that doctors and coaches recommend:
  - Start slowly. Your feet need time to grow tough skin. Start by walking short distances without shoes, and increase your distances very slowly to give your body time to adapt.
  - Listen to your body. In addition to the skin on your feet, your muscles and joints
    will need time to get used to walking and running without the support of shoes.
    If your feet or muscles ache, stop what you're doing and don't increase your
    workout until you feel comfortable.
  - Take care of your muscles. Stretch your legs often and massage your feet and lower legs to help muscles heal and gain strength. Stretching also helps your Achilles tendon and feet stay flexible.
  - Make sure it feels right. You will naturally be able to feel when you are landing comfortably on your feet. If you notice too much of a shock when you land, slow down and focus on how your feet are meeting the ground. A gentle landing will feel almost like bouncing or jumping.



# **Human Adaptation** to Space

- In April 1961, Russian cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin made history when he became the first man to travel in space. On July 20, 1969, American astronaut Neil Armstrong became the first man to walk on the
  - 5 Moon. Now that humans have been to the Moon and robots have been sent to Mars, some people believe the next step is for humans to visit Mars. There's no doubt that the first person to walk on Mars will become as famous as Gagarin or Armstrong,
  - and many astronauts would love the opportunity. But what is space travel really like for the men and women who go on these missions?

In zero gravity, astronauts can support each other with one finger. Many astronauts suffer physical problems on these missions, even if they are in space for just a few months. Some of these problems are short-lived; others may be 15 long-lasting. More than two-thirds of all astronauts suffer from motion sickness while traveling in space. In an environment without gravity, the body cannot tell up from down. The body's internal balance system sends confusing signals to the brain, which can result in nausea<sup>1</sup> lasting as long as a few days. The amount of blood and other fluids in the body also ends up being **distributed** differently after an extended period of time in this environment. More fluid than normal ends up in the face, neck, and chest, resulting in a puffy face, bulging neck veins, and a slightly enlarged heart.

For the duration of their mission, astronauts experience conditions that affect their health. For example, their bones get weaker and they may lose muscle. Being in a

weightless environment means that astronauts tend not to use the muscles they rely upon on Earth, so their muscles gradually atrophy. This, combined with the shift of fluid to the upper body and the resulting loss of essential minerals (such as calcium), causes bones to weaken. As a result, many astronauts are unable to walk properly for a few days upon their return to Earth. In addition, they are **exposed** to radiation from the sun, which is more **intense** without the Earth's atmosphere to protect them. This puts them at a higher risk of cancer.

- In addition to physical difficulties, astronauts who travel for long periods may also suffer from psychological stress. Space travel requires astronauts to be very focused, balanced people. The irregular sleep, long working hours, and the lack of night and day can affect a person's emotions and stress level. Being able to control one's emotions is an important characteristic for an astronaut.
- 40 A major factor that affects astronauts' mental well-being is time. To date, astronauts have only spent a few months in space at a time, but longer **expeditions** would require astronauts to spend significantly more time inside a spaceship. For example, a round-trip expedition to Mars could take about three years. Being **confined** in a small space for such a long period of time is not healthy. Research has shown that travelers

on such long journeys—such as sailors or explorers in the Arctic—have an above-average chance of suffering from depression.

Astronauts—especially those who
achieved significant "firsts" such as
Gagarin and Armstrong—are often seen
as exciting adventurers. This may be
accurate, but it's also worth remembering
their dedication and the **sacrifices** they
make to explore our universe.

Throughout the ages, inventors have been labeled dreamers for daring to imagine possibilities beyond what already exists. Of course, many have proven their critics wrong and brought their ideas to life, thus changing the world and the way we live. Here are three inventors who refused to give up on the "impossible" idea of human 5 flight.

#### The Legend of Wan Hu

On October 15, 2003, €hiña launched its first proper spaceship. Astronaut Yang Liwei was the first Chinese national sent into space, thus fulfilling a dream that had its roots in a much earlier time. Legend has it that in A.D. 1500 a man named Wan Hu prepared 10 his own mission into space. At that time, the Chinese invention of gunpowder was widely used in rockets for military purposes as well as in fireworks. Wan Hu devised a risky plan to use the power of such rockets to take him to the stars.

The story goes that Wan Hu built the first spaceship: a chair with powerful gunpowder rockets and two kites attached to it. On the day of the launch, each of the 47 rockets was lit by 47 servants carrying torches. The servants then moved back and waited. What followed was a huge explosion: Wan Hu and his primitive spaceship had disappeared completely. Although the story may seem a little far-fetched, Wan Hu's crazy plan involving rocket power actually contained the basic **principles** of spaceflight.

#### **Howard Hughes's Spruce Goose**

20 On November 2, 1947, a crowd of people at San Pedro harbor in Los Angeles witnessed an important moment in flight history. An enormous flying boat, nicknamed the Spruce Goose, sped across the bay and rose 70 feet (21 meters) above

25 the water. After just under a minute, it landed perfectly one mile (1.6 kilometers) down the bay. It was the first and last time the boat ever flew.



The Spruce Goose prepares to take off



The concept for construction of the Spruce Goose came from the need for more effective ways of transporting people and materials in World War II. The idea came from a man called Henry Kaiser, but it was Howard Hughes, the legendary multimillionaire, who actually developed the flying boat. It was the biggest airplane ever built—it still holds the record for the greatest wingspan<sup>1</sup>—and it was made entirely of wood.

In the end, though, the project failed for various reasons: it was too expensive to operate, working with wood was slow and difficult, and Hughes' desire for perfection caused the project to finish **behind schedule**. By the time the Spruce Goose was completed, the war was long over. However, many of its design features have been incorporated into modern planes. Like other pioneers in the field of transportation, Hughes was simply ahead of his time.

#### The Futuristic Ideas of Leonardo da Vinci

Centuries before the Spruce Goose, another inventor was
planning a different kind of flying machine. Leonardo da Vinci,
perhaps the most famous artist of the Renaissance<sup>2</sup> period,
was inspired by the science of how birds fly. He wanted to build
machines with flapping wings which would be controlled and
steered by human pilots, but his dreams remained just that—
dreams. It took almost 500 years for Leonardo's ideas to be
tested. In June 2000, a professional parachutist named Adrian
Nicholas jumped out of a hot-air balloon over the South African
countryside. He used a parachute made of wood and canvas<sup>3</sup>
based on one of Leonardo's designs. Nicholas landed safely, and

Leonardo's dream became reality.

These three individuals—Wan Hu, Howard Hughes, and Leonardo da Vinci—came from places and cultures that are about as different as we can imagine. What they shared was a fascination

with flying, a spirit of **innovation**, and the courage to make their dreams come true.






# Modern Family Magazine Is An Only Child a Lonely Child?



This month in *Modern Family*, child psychologist Dr. Ethan Stephens answers a question from Andrea Gonzales, who writes:

Dear Dr. Stephens,

My husband and I are facing a dilemma, namely, the issue of whether to have a second child. We already have one healthy, happy five-year-old son. Both of us have demanding jobs and limited time and financial resources, but we also want to make sure that our only child does not become a lonely child. What are the pros and cons of having a second child?



#### Dear Andrea.

This is one of the most difficult issues that parents nowadays face. As you point out, a concern that is often heard with regard to only children is whether one child necessarily means a lonely child. Many parents feel a **stigma** associated with their decision to have only one child, fearing they are seen as thinking only about themselves as opposed to about their child's well-being. There are no other children in the family for the child to associate with, which may lead to the child feeling lonely, especially if both parents are working.

- 20 Another common argument against having just one child is that an only child may be more spoiled than one with siblings. Many people believe that a single child will not have learned to **negotiate** with others or respect the give-and-take involved in many relationships. Some think this may leave the child less capable of interacting well with people his or her own age than one who has been raised with siblings.
- 25 Your son is not alone in being an only child. There's an increasing trend for choosing to have only one child for the very same reasons you listed. In South Korea, for example,



the percentage of families with only one child is higher than ever. This follows a general trend in Asia where in many countries—including Japan, China, Singapore, and Thailand—couples are having on average fewer than two children.



Advocates of single-child families argue that there 30 are advantages for the child as well as the parents. With just one child, they suggest, there is less potential for family arguments arising from sibling jealousy or parents favoring one child over the other(s). Moreover, with only one child, the parents can afford to give more quality time and attention. This often leads to increased **self-esteem**, which, combined with increased independence, can lead to the child being more confident. There are a number

of ways that parents can help to ensure that their only child doesn't get lonely. Here are some suggestions for parenting an only child:

- Let them be social. Children need friends their age and playing in a group encourages skills like sharing, teamwork, and patience. Find ways for your child to socialize, such as play groups, sports, or summer camp.
- Welcome challenges. Only children learn to do many things for themselves, though they will need your help for some things. Encourage your child to challenge himself by solving problems independently.
  - Alone time is okay, too. As much as you want to help your child interact well with others, don't worry too much about a child who is **content** to keep to himself. Time spent alone contributes to personality development and decision-making skills.

Unfortunately, Andrea, there is no simple answer to the question of whether or not to have a second child. The **circumstances** affecting each set of parents are unique; I always believe what is appropriate for one family may not be for another. The important thing, in the end, is to make a decision that both you and your husband feel confident about.



# Changing Roles: The Rise of Stay-at-Home Dads

As little as 50 years ago, few people in the U.S. questioned the gender roles that had been in place for centuries. Many people assumed that a woman's place was in the home, and that a man's main responsibility to his family was to put food on the table. In the 1970s and '80s, however, greater numbers of working women meant that men were no longer the **sole** breadwinners. A father's involvement with his family also became more important. Even so, back then, almost no husbands were "stay-at-home dads." Today, with more career opportunities than ever available to women, the stay-at-home dad trend is on the rise.

A family with a full-time dad has many benefits. If the wife is a career woman, her husband can take some family responsibilities off her shoulders, thereby allowing her to compete more successfully in the workplace. The men share in the joy of participating in their children's day-to-day experiences. Differences in parenting styles between men and women are also believed to contribute to children's well-being. Studies suggest that a strong paternal<sup>2</sup> presence encourages greater curiosity, higher self-esteem, and better emotional balance in the child. Societies with strong family units also report lower juvenile crime rates and lower rates of teen pregnancy. Robert Frank, a professor of child development at Oakton Community College in the U.S., notes that working mothers aren't necessarily absent from the home; many women form a close relationship with their kids regardless.

In response to the recent increase in stay-at-home dads, new resources are becoming available. Playgroups are being planned for dads and their children. When Ryan Warren said that he felt out-of-place in groups that often consisted of all moms, his wife found a local group that hosted events for dads like Ryan and their children. "[My daughter] could play with other kids her age, and I could hang out with other fathers going through the same experience," says Ryan. "In the group, we talk about the traditional guy things—sports, tools, cars."



Moving from a professional career to becoming an at-home parent is another challenge for these modern dads. But some men are finding ways to stay active with their career goals while 30 parenting at home. Dad and blogger Hunter Montgomery is a great example of a father who balances home life with career aspirations. "I was a full-time stay-at-home-dad, but I didn't plan it that way," says Hunter. "My intention

35

was to continue work as a mortgage loan officer from home; it's the type of work you can easily do remotely."

Hunter's wife, Christi, has a career in the U.S. Navy that sometimes requires the family to relocate. When Hunter and Christi had their first child, they already knew that they would have to move within a year. To help with the **transition**, Hunter left his job to become a stay-at-home dad. Hunter was always interested in personal finances and, being home to watch the kids, he studied part-time to complete a master's degree in Family Financial Planning. Hunter started a blog, Financially Consumed, as a way to stay active in his career by sharing tips and experiences with others. Despite many

challenges, Hunter says he has found a way to balance both **priorities** of his family and his career. "All three of our kids are in school, and I have some time each day to pursue my interests," says Hunter. "I'm loving it."

It's safe to say that the stay-at-home dad is here to stay. As more and more dads find new ways to stay active socially and in their careers while parenting, they contribute immensely to the flexibility of the father's role in the modern family.

# Modern Fitness Trends

Back in the 1980s, aerobics classes and leg-warmers (a type of sock that fits over the calves) were immensely popular. In the decade before that, bodybuilding was all the rage and Arnold Schwarzenegger was a huge icon for young men. The fitness world is always moving, and trends come and go very quickly. Here are three of the most popular fitness trends right now. Which ones would you like to try?

# If you love to exercise and want to have fun with fitness, try Zumba.

Zumba is an immensely popular fitness program featuring Latin-inspired aerobice moves set to energetic music. It's been called the "world's biggest fitness party" by its followers, with over 14 million people taking weekly classes, four million Zumba DVDs sold, and a line of "Zumbawear" clothing that has taken off.

The concept of Zumba came about by mistake, thanks to the quick thinking of a fitness instructor named Beto Perez. He was about to teach an aerobics class in his hometown of Cali, Colombia, when
 he realized he had forgotten his aerobics music. He only had one cassette tape with him which was full of Latin music.
 "I improvised," he said, "and that was the




beginning of Zumba." Instead of traditional fitness classes where steps are counted out loud to the beat of the music, Zumba has a free-flowing and party-like atmosphere. This proved popular with people who were fed up with working out, and Zumba moved from just another fitness fad to a true fitness phenomenon.

# If you like intense activities and are up for a challenge, try CrossFit.

"No, it doesn't ever get any easier. You wouldn't want it to either." This quote by Greg Glassman, founder of CrossFit, says all you need to know about what some consider the most challenging fitness program ever.

Instead of featuring just one activity such as running or weight-lifting, CrossFit tries to integrate gymnastics, track and field skills, and bodybuilding into a short and intense workout. A Workout of the Day (or WOD) may involve doing 20 pushups, followed by 10 pull-ups, and then an 800 meter run—then repeating the set as many times as possible in 20 minutes. Because the workouts change every day, the body does not easily adapt and is always challenged. Of course, a danger is that some people go overboard and risk injury or, at the very least, suffer aches and pains for a few days.



But for people who like to push the limits of fitness and strength—there are many police officers, firefighters, and military people who follow it—CrossFit is the key.

# If you prefer slower activities and want a good stretch, try Hot yoga

Most people think that yoga is all about stretching. While stretching is indeed a large part of yoga, it is also about creating balance in the body through strength and flexibility, and creating peace in the mind by forcing the person to concentrate on each pose. Hot yoga is seen as more challenging compared to other forms of yoga, mostly because it's performed in a studio that is heated up to 40 degrees Celsius and with a high level of humidity. It may be a struggle at first to remain in the heated room for the full class, but it gets easier over time!

While many yoga studios offer some form of hot yoga, the most popular is Bikram Yoga, named for its founder Bikram Choudhury. Each Bikram yoga class lasts 90 minutes and consists of 26 different poses. It is believed that doing yoga in a heated and humid room helps a person to stretch deeper and helps to prevent injuries. Choudhury also claims that sweating will help cleanse the body of toxins and keep the internal organs in good health.

# SPACE TRAVEL AND SCIENCE FICTION

Space travel and science fiction have long been connected. Writers of science fiction, as well as creators of science fiction TV shows, and movies, often study the latest scientific


- 5 concepts and use or adapt them to help portray what future space travel, space ships,
  - and space stations might look like. In turn, science fiction writers such as Jules Verne have dreamed up ideas and concepts of space travel which inspired generations of scientists and engineers to develop new space technologies.
- Jules Verne (1828–1905) was a French author and a pioneer of science fiction. In his novels From the Earth to the Moon (1865) and Around the Moon (1870), a kind of space ship is fired at the moon from a 900-foot-long cannon. At one point in their journey, the three travelers are deprived of gravity and float around their small ship. Rockets are used to slow the ship down before landing on the moon.
- Given the time in which he was writing, Verne's predictions were very good. The size of his space ship was about the size of the first one to go to the moon, the *Apollo*, minus its large rockets. Both Verne's ship and the *Apollo* carried three people
- into space. Furthermore, rockets were indeed used by the Apollo to slow its descent. However, Verne's ship shot his travelers into space, which never could have worked. The intense pressure of firing a



Apollo 11 begins its flight to the moon on July 16, 1969.

spaceship the way one would fire a bullet from a gun would cause great physiological damage to the crew.


During the first half of the 20th century, science fiction novels and comic books were very popular in the United States. Their portrayal of space travel was less far-fetched than Verne's and were often based on the space reseatch of that time. For example, pictures began showing astronauts in space suits when writers realized that exposing human beings to the cold, airless environment of space was lethal. Ideas of other planets



were still often wrong, though. A 1928 drawing of a moon circling the planet Jupiter shows it covered in plant life. It was only discovered later that the other planets and moons around our sun are without life as we know it on Earth.

Drawings in the early 20th century also showed very large space ships and stations, almost like floating cities. Writers at the time knew that trips to other stars would take hundreds of years. Those who left Earth would die on the journey there, leaving their descendants to arrive at the destination instead. Some writers addressed this problem by using the concept of suspended animation—a deep sleep in which a person doesn't grow older. Such travelers would awaken at the end of their journey, hundreds of years in the future. It is not impossible that these ideas could become reality one day.

As the American space program begun to grow, the television series *Star Trek* became very popular. The series follows the adventures of a large space ship with over 400 crew members that flies around the universe at "warp speed," going faster than the speed of light. This is a wonderful dream, but it will probably never be realized. According to the current laws of physics, it is impossible for any object to travel faster than the speed of light.

Science fiction has walked hand in hand with advances in science and technology, and writers continue to study scientific concepts and to use them to portray the future. Looking back at their ideas, some were correct and cannot be distinguished from today's reality; many others were nothing but fiction. However, science fiction writers continue to inspire new generations of people to dream of someday going into space.

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# Single-Parent Families: **Changing Views**

The two-parent family is traditionally seen as the best way to raise children. In the past, single-parent families have had to deal with the stigma attached to their life choices. Nowadays, however, the single-parent family is the fastest growing type of family. Single parenthood can be the result of the death, divorce, or separation, but it can also 5 result from single-parent adoption or women having children on their own thanks to fertility treaments. Whether they elect to be single parents or have no choice, single parents are usually at a disadvantage in many ways compared to two-parent families. In a family with only one breadwinner, money is often in short supply. Compared to homes where one parent is wholly dedicated to child rearing while the other works, children in single-parent homes receive less attention. Single parents can find themselves overwhelmed by their responsibilities both at work and at home.

There are some interesting statistics over the years concerning children of single parents. It's been well-documented that children from single-parent families have a slightly higher chance of becoming juvenile criminals. Other studies claim that these children are also more likely to drop out of school in their teens and to be jobless in their early 20s. A connection has even been made between children of single parents and higher rates of obesity<sup>1</sup> and using illegal drugs.

Research has shown that there are certain factors that help single-parent families. One thing these successful families have in common is a strong support network, such as extended

family, friends, or even special interest groups.
Single parents need to remember that nobody
does it alone and there are many resources
available to help them. For example, there may
be government or non-profit organizations
dedicated to helping single-parent families,
or they can even turn to schools, community
centers, and religious organizations.

Single-parent families may even have certain advantages over two-parent families. Single parents have greater flexibility in spending time with children, because they don't have to take



the needs and schedule of a partner into consideration. Another advantage comes from the fact that single parents are more inclined to work together with their children to solve problems. This give-and-take between parents and children can make children feel more needed and valued, and give them a larger sense of responsibility.

It's important to mention the special challenges faced by the single father. Even today, when the social and family roles of males and females are less defined than in the 50s and 60s, many people are reluctant to admit that men can be effective single parents. Modern men are more willing and able to cook and clean—responsibilities that were once exclusively assigned to women. Single fathers may also show more interest in the education and protection of their children, and report developing closer relationships as single parents.

Perhaps the most significant change is in society's attitudes towards single-parent families. There is much less discrimination both in terms of laws and how people view them. As single-parent families become more common, more and more people will start to view these family arrangements as normal. With enough community acceptance and support, the negative statistics linking single-parent families to youth crime and delinquency will definitely improve. Single parents no longer have to fear whether their child(ren) will be treated differently to their peers.



When I was struggling with my chemistry class last semester, a professor suggested that I join a study group or get a tutor to supplement what we were studying in class. I couldn't afford a tutor and my schedule at university was so erratic—I couldn't arrange anything with classmates, especially ones I barely knew. Then a friend suggested going online. I can't believe I didn't think about it earlier! Online learning is perfect for me because it offers so much flexibility. Whenever I have free time, I can seek out

lessons that revisit what my classes have been covering. And unlike being in class, I can pause the videos or watch them many times until I understand the concepts.

Another great thing about online lessons is that there are so many different educators out there, each with their own unique style and perspective. Internet Learning isn't for Everyone

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This spring I had an internship in Paris. Since I had time, I decided to take a couple of university courses online. I also looked for study material online to supplement my course, as recommended by a professor. At first, I found that resources online were plentiful and varied. However, I spent a lot of time locating lessons that offered reliable content, and for the specific topics I was searching for. When I did find classes with helpful material, I often felt there was something missing.

I soon realized that I was missing the teacher-

student and student-student interactions of a conventional classroom and it was having a negative effect on my learning. I realized I learn best in a social environment with lots of opportunities for discussion. Studying on my own was boring and there were too many things to **distract** me online. I also didn't have the motivation or encouragement you get from teachers and classmates. Because I assumed I could study any time, I almost stopped studying completely until everything was due at the end of the semester! I think I'm the kind of person who needs the **pacing** and regular deadlines of a class.

To be fair, I certainly found material that was very helpful. But I was spending as much time on these lessons as I was on my own classwork and didn't have anything to show for it. I hear there are now online courses available where you can get your work marked by professors and be awarded a certificate if you pass. But I can't see people choosing to do these courses as a replacement for an actual university course and degree. It'll be a long time before employers and companies recognize such online credits<sup>1</sup> or degrees.

It's really great that quality education is being made available for free, but for me, online lessons probably work best as something extra to support my classroom experience.

## Plagiarism and the Internet



The Internet is the largest library in the history of the world and a great resource for anyone seeking information. But doing research on the Internet is not without its risks. In recent years, plagiarism from online sources has become a serious problem, especially among students.

- Original written work and information are protected by copyright laws, like original inventions. Therefore, when you reference or use information you find while doing research, you should always give credit to the person or organization that produced it. To plagiarize is to use ideas that are not your own without giving credit to the original source, or to claim that someone else's ideas are your own. It is akin to stealing
- someone else's work. For example, if a student reads three articles and uses ideas from the articles to make his arguments in an essay without quoting or citing from the original work, the student is plagiarizing.
  - Internet-related plagiarism has become such a problem because it is so easy to find and copy information online. There are thousands of resources for students who
- wish only to copy or **cheat**. However, the Internet also makes it easier for educators to check for plagiarism. Often a simple Internet search for a quote will be enough to expose copying. Some educators are more concerned about unintended plagiarism. Because copying and pasting is so easy, it is becoming more and more common for well-meaning students to mix up source material with their original ideas. While this
- kind of plagiarism usually happens innocently, it is still an offense.
  - In addition to being a dishonest practice, plagiarism is a lost opportunity for students. The Yale College Writing Center, which is part of the prestigious Yale University in the United States, cautions, "If you paste in someone's words as your own, you will miss the opportunity to add your commentary, and therefore miss an opportunity to grow as
- a thinker and writer." The practice of writing is to share one's own ideas and creative talent, but poor citation makes it unclear whether the writer is working out his own ideas or just playing with someone else's.


When working on a complex research assignment, managing your sources can become challenging. Here are some tips to keep your sources in order and avoid plagiarizing:

Copy and paste important information.

The first step of researching is to gather information. Be efficient and keep a computer document named "References"



- Print out important articles. When printing the whole document is not possible, print the first page of the article, which lists crucial details like the name of the writer and publication, and the date of publication. Then print pages that have the information you need and highlight the most important details.
- Use software meant for managing sources. Most universities and schools provide students with free or low-cost software that is designed to keep track of information. To save time, many programs will automatically format your citations so you don't have to type everything out yourself.
- Insert citations into your drafts. Most word processing programs have a "comment" feature. This allows you to add notes throughout the document that aren't included in the document's word count and can be easily hidden. Every time you quote a source, type the source's citation into a comment box. This will save time when you have to compile everything into a bibliography.1
  - Double-check your work. In the same way that you review your work for clarity
    and mistakes, you need to check that you have matched the quoted information
    with the correct source.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> A **bibliography** is a list of source materials used in the preparation of a work or referred to in the text.

## The Mysteries of Memory Loss

- Many people claim to have a bad memory, and it's true that we have trouble at times remembering where we put our house keys or recalling the names of people we've recently met. But there are 5 those who suffer more serious memory problems, including memory loss over time or memory loss due to injury, disease, or **complications** of surgery.
  - These conditions are still not very well understood by doctors and scientists.
- Many people experience memory loss as they age. In the past, neuroscientists doctors who study the brain—had theories about how the brain contained only a certain number of cells and how, over time, these cells might get used up. More recent research suggests that the brain may continue to manufacture new brain cells throughout a lifetime. Also, there is now evidence that damage to the hippocampus an area of the brain thought to be important in the process of recalling information may play an important role in memory loss. Studies conducted on patients who have suffered damage to this area of the brain show that while they can still recall memories stored before the brain was damaged, they are unable to remember new facts. In addition, diseases associated with old age, (such as Alzheimer's,) and other problems involving short- and long-term memory loss, are now being traced to 20 possible damage to the hippocampus.
- Two very special patients have helped doctors study memory and the hippocampus 3 in recent years. These two men are referred to only as EP and HM, and each of them suffered memory loss after the loss of this particular section of the brain. HM suffered a head injury as a child and later underwent experimental brain surgery to remove most of his hippocampus. EP, in contrast, contracted a disease that ate away much of his hippocampus. Both men are now unable to form new memories, but they can remember some things from before their traumas. For example, both EP and HM are likely to recall things they learned in school or family memories from their youth, but both will also always think it's the first time they've met you, **no matter** how many 30 times you may have met previously.

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- Through HM, who has been studied much longer than EP, researchers have learned about different memory abilities. Even though HM couldn't say what he'd had for breakfast or name the current U.S. President, there were some things that he could remember. Scientists found that he was able to learn complicated tasks without even realizing it. In one study, he learned how to recreate a drawing by only seeing the drawing's **reflection** in a mirror. Each time HM did the task, he claimed never to have tried it before. And yet, each day his brain got better at guiding his hand to work in **reverse**.
- Scientists generally **classify** memories into two categories: *declarative* and non-declarative. Declarative memories are things you know you remember, like the color of your car or what happened yesterday afternoon. EP and HM have lost the ability to make new declarative memories. Non-declarative memories are the things you know without **consciously** doing them, like how to ride a bike or how to walk from your bed to your bathroom. Those unconscious memories don't rely on the hippocampus.

  They happen in completely different parts of the brain. As EP and HM so **strikingly** demonstrate, you can damage one part of the brain and the rest will keep on working.
- The exact process by which memories are coded and retrieved remains a mystery, but scientists and doctors are working to better understand the brain's remarkable ability to store and recall information.



## Words to Remember

How many English words do you need to know in order to be considered fluent? Experts disagree on the exact number of words learners need to know to achieve fluency in a new language, but 5 they generally agree that you need to know at least several thousand. Many language learners have at some point wished that they could simply insert a computer chip into their memories containing all




a disease-free brain (top) and a brain affected by Alzheimer's disease (bottom)

the vocabulary of the target language. Although that isn't yet **feasible**, with training, the potential of the human memory can be unlocked. Many teachers suggest accelerating the vocabulary-building process by using mnemonics.

Simply put, mnemonics are methods used to help remember information that is otherwise difficult to recall. There are a wide variety of methods and different ones work better for different people, depending on their learning styles. The loci method is a primarily visual system of remembering things. The association method encourages people to link target words to memorable images and utilize their senses. The grouping method works well for people who are good at linking concepts and organizing ideas together.

#### The loci method

This method is very useful for remembering lists of words. Before using this method, 20 it is necessary to visualize a path that you know well, such as the way to school or to work. Next, looking at your list of words, you'll need to create an image for each word, ideally one that is vivid and memorable. For example, for the word "accelerate," you might choose the image of a race car; an image for the word "enormous" might be a dinosaur. Creating these images may take a little practice. Then, imagine yourself <sup>25</sup> walking down your path and put the images you associated with the words at certain



common **landmarks**, like seeing a race car at the convenience store, a dinosaur in the park, etc. Finally, put away the list and move along the path in your mind again, recalling as many words as you can.

#### The association method

To commit a word to memory, it can help to associate it with an image that is memorable in some way—colorful, funny, embarrassing, beautiful, etc. For example, if you are trying to remember the meaning of the word "**tremendous**," you might associate it with tremendously large trees and men. This image is connected to the word not only in meaning, but also in the sound of the first two syllables of the word.

Say the word "tremendous", and you hear "tree" and "men." This pairing of meaning, sound, and images can help you memorize new words more quickly.

#### The grouping method

Try to memorize the following words: radio, pencil, index card, notebook, book, marker, magazine, newspaper, stereo, pen, MP3 player, paper. These words are meaningless on their own. But try dividing the list up into smaller groups (things you write with, things you write on, things you read, and things you listen to) and you'll probably find that you are able to **recollect** more words. When you encounter word lists that aren't so clearly divisible, you may need to be creative about categorizing the words.

What these three methods of memorization have in common is the idea of active learning. While it is certainly possible to **absorb** a great deal of information by just listening or reading, there is no guarantee that the information will remain in your memory in the future. We've looked at just a few of the many types of mnemonic devices that can be applied by language learners. In the end, it really depends on your own learning style and how you best retain information. Why not try a variety of methods and find the ones that work best for you?



# The Evolution of Batman

The Dark Knight—one nickname for Batman—is a name that's layered with meaning. Batman is a classic super hero, but the modern day Batman is a far more complex character than he was 70 years ago. Over time, he has evolved from an invincible crime fighter into one of the most "human" superheroes, one who is often faced with dilemmas that challenge his morals and 5 conscience. The nickname "Dark Knight" fits the character we know today because Batman is always in pursuit of justice, but who finds that difficult sacrifices must often be made along the way.

Batman was created in 1939 by artist Robert Kane, who was inspired by crime novels, another comic character called Zorro, and an earlier horror film

10 called The Bat. Because Kane preferred more realistic heroes, Batman was not given super powers. Instead, Bruce Wayne (Batman's alter ego1) is extremely rich and can afford many useful tools and weapons, such as the Batmobile, a car

15 with special capabilities. Batman's original suit and iconic "bat signal" have endured as well. While the design and colors have changed gradually over time, the Batman identity—bat logo, mask with


ears, cape—has been remarkably consistent for more than 70 years.

One thing that hasn't remained so similar over the years is the tone of the Batman stories and, accordingly, Batman's personality. The conflicts in Batman stories are often based on realworld problems, which is one element that makes Batman a more complex character than most super heroes. Not long after the creation of Batman, World War II began. The American government spent lots of time and energy getting its people to be patriotic and to support the war. Batman appeared in a 15-part serialized movie at this time and was seen as a symbol of

justice, fighting evil at home while American soldiers were away defending the country. At that time, he sometimes used guns and wasn't afraid to kill his enemies if there was a need to, but the modern Batman is generally against guns and killing because his parents were killed by guns.

The mood in the United States relaxed considerably by the 1960s, and a Batman show 30 Subsequently appeared on television with a very different kind of superhero. The show became popular with kids and adults alike for its cultural references, cartoonish fight scenes, and funny




dialog. Following the end of the original television series in 1968, the television version of Batman was limited to cartoons for the next two decades.

In the 1970s and '80s, Batman was **embraced** by comic 35 book writers and re-imagined as a more serious character. When legendary comics writers like Frank Miller and Alan Moore began to write Batman books, the Batman we know today—darker, imperfect, vulnerable—began to emerge. Miller is often credited with taking the comics genre to a 40 new level with his Batman book The Dark Knight Returns, which was among the first to incorporate real-world elements such as corrupt politicians and poverty. In his hands, Batman went beyond being just a masked hero.

Batman returned to the big screen in 1989 in Tim Burton's Batman. It 45 featured a tougher Batman, with a colder personality and a redesigned, all-black costume. In the latest Batman films, the hero's transformation continues in this direction. Christopher Nolan's Dark Knight trilogy<sup>2</sup> features a much more dangerous Gotham City and Bruce Wayne/Batman 50 are not automatically likable characters. Batman no longer simply fights against "bad guys," but starts to question if he's a good guy or hero himself. Villains like the Joker are no longer crazy personalities with weird hair and makeup that just want to rob a bank or kidnap a famous person; they are 55 now similar to modern day terrorists, trying to make people fight one another and threatening the world economy.

What makes Batman a great character is that he changes as the world changes. So while it is safe to expect that Batman will be a different character in 20 years' time, we can also expect that he will continue to be a great and compelling superhero.





- Superhero movies based on comic books have long been good business for Hollywood. Some of the most successful superhero movies, like The Avengers (2012), The Dark Knight (2008), and Spiderman (2002) have earned upwards of \$400 million each at the box office. The appeal of superhero movies is obvious: it brings familiar and well-loved characters to audiences, and these long-running comic series can easily be extended into movie sequels. Thanks to the success of these movies, more serious comic books such as graphic novels have also been adapted for the big screen.
- The term "graphic novel" became popular in the 1980s when people wanted to distinguish between the colorful comic books aimed at kids and more complex stories aimed at older, more mature readers. While classic comic books feature crime-fighting superheroes, graphic novels cover many genres and are frequently about real-life issues. Ghost World by Daniel Clowes, which follows two friends through the summer after their high school graduation, is an early example of a graphic novel that was made into a film. Another recent graphic novel adaptation is Marjane Satrapi's Persepolis, which documents her youth in Iran during and after the Islamic revolution of 1979.
- Watchmen by Alan Moore and Dave Gibbons is a great example 3 of a graphic novel that has been successfully adapted for film. The only graphic novel to appear in Time magazine's list of the best 100 books since 1923, Watchmen was also a box office hit, earning more than \$180 million around the world. Director Zack Snyder says movies based on graphic novels appeal to movie audiences because they are deep, vivid stories. "Watchmen is thick and complicated and violent and political and critical of America," Snyder says. "It's huge."
- But taking a graphic novel off the page and on to the screen isn't as simple as it sounds. The most challenging part for screenwriters and directors is attempting to make a movie that deviates from the original. Authors are able to take risks in

graphic novels that directors are unable **to pull off** believably on screen. For example, Watchmen was considered "unfilmable" by many, including the writer Alan Moore himself, because of the many different plot lines and time frames. While changes may make the story more appealing to **mainstream** audiences, fans of the original material are important and **unrelenting** critics. Snyder remarked, "The geeks will be on me for changes I make to Watchmen. There are no more fierce fans than geekdom."



- Risks aside, one major appeal of graphic novels for movie studios is that the visual format allows them to "see" what the movie could look like before they approve it. This can be a great advantage over a traditional script, which requires the reader to imagine the characters and setting. Having a pre-defined style has also led to the creation of some very unique movies. Two great examples of graphic novels that had their style
- translated to the screen are Frank Miller's *Sin City* and *300*. The film adaptation of *Sin City* **retains** the original story's dark look and feel because the directors—Miller and Robert Rodriguez—shot it in a shadowy black and white style with only certain colors allowed, such as the bright yellow of the main villain.



Turning a hand-drawn comic into a live-action film can be tricky, and directors must
attempt to create scenes with the same **intricate** detail as in the graphic novel, often
on a tight budget. For 300, Snyder had to use special color filters and other techniques,
such as speeding up or slowing down the action, to help **convey** the action and bloody
violence of the book. By Hollywood standards, the \$60 million budget that Snyder had
to work with isn't a lot of money, but as such movies continue to wow audiences and
make money, production budgets are sure to rise. Maybe your favorite graphic novel
will soon be coming to a screen near you!



# SCHOOLING A Better Way to Learn?

- It is easy to forget that public education is a relatively new phenomenon. Even in the U.S., which 0 has a relatively developed education system, public schools only started flourishing in the early 19th century. Before that, while the affluent were able to hire tutors for their children, most education of children took place within the family and the community. Some people are now going back to teaching children themselves (or hiring tutors), especially in countries where the mainstream education system is considered poor.
- The laws regarding homeschooling can be complex and vary widely from country to country. In 2 some countries, such as France, England, Indonesia, and the United States, homeschooling is permitted by law. In other countries like Japan or Spain, laws are not so clear; homeschooling goes on but isn't formally permitted by existing laws. Other countries, including Germany and Brazil, ban homeschooling altogether.
- At one time, there was a stigma associated with homeschooling because it was traditionally 3 for students who had behavioral or learning difficulties and could not keep up with the rest of the class. Today, there are many compelling arguments for educating one's children at home. Some of it stems from dissatisfaction with the mainstream education system. Teacher shortages and lack of funding mean that, in many schools, one teacher is responsible for 30 or 40 pupils; children are often deprived of the attention they need. Bullying and increasing classroom violence have also motivated some parents to remove their children from school. Parents may also choose to homeschool for religious or political reasons.
- Many psychologists see the home as the most natural learning environment, since it is supportive and has no distractions. Parents who homeschool say they can monitor their children's education more closely. Children 25 can also choose what and when to study, thus enabling them to learn at their own pace. The many educational resources on the Internet can also be used to supplement learning. Advocates of homeschooling point out that homeschooled 30 children do just as well or better than those who are classroom-taught, and a striking number gain admission to prestigious universities.



In contrast, critics of homeschooling say that children miss out on learning important social 5 skills because they have little interaction with their peers. This might have a negative effect on them later in life when they go to university or start work. Critics have also raised concerns about whether parents are capable of educating their child properly. Many of these parents lack teacher training and may not be competent or up-to-date on all the subjects taught in schools.



In the U.S., with an increasing number of parents taking their children out of class,

school officials are looking for ways to restore parents' confidence in the public education system. Some American high schools have opened their doors to homeschoolers on a part-time basis,

allowing these children to attend classes once or twice a week, or to take part in activities such as playing football.

This enables homeschooled children to enjoy the extra benefits of peer interaction

and involvement in sports or clubs.

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Whatever the arguments for or against, homeschooling is a growing trend. There are now websites and support groups that help parents to assert their rights and enable them to learn more about educating their children. Once the last resort for troubled children, homeschooling is now embraced as an accepted alternative to the public educational system.





# You Can Be a World Memory Champion!



- Every year, people with extraordinary memory skills compete in a unique event called the World Memory Championships. The tasks they are required to do require tremendous powers of memory retention: looking at and reciting a two-page poem; recollecting a page of 40-digit numbers; remembering the order of 52 cards in a deck; memorizing the names of 110 people
  - after looking at their pictures; and several other demanding tasks. Completing any of these tasks may not seem feasible for the average person, but scientific evidence seems to show that even someone with average skills can, through training, enhance his or her memory skills and be transformed into a memory champion.
- One memory champion explained his method of recalling the order of the cards in a deck. Previously, he linked a person, an action, and a thing to each card in the deck. For example, the king of hearts is Elvis Presley, eating, a peanut butter sandwich.
  - The three of spades is Rocky Balboa, boxing, Madison Square Garden. The ten of hearts is William Shakespeare, writing Hamlet, a broken pen. Take a person from the first card, an action from the second card, and
  - 20 a thing from the third card. Then any group of three cards creates a vivid image that

is more easily recalled. For example: king-tenthree becomes Elvis Presley writing Hamlet in Madison Square Garden—a memorable image.

3 25 Still, even having created images for each group of three cards, it is difficult to keep them in order. This is done using the loci method, or what some call a "Memory Palace" —a term created by Frances Yates in his 1966 book The

30 Art of Memory — which is a simple yet effective method devised by the ancient Greeks. They practised transforming lists of words into vivid

sets of objects, which they arranged in their imagination around familiar spaces. Then they learned to link these images back to their original meaning.

- But are there people with naturally superior memories? We've all heard of people with photographic memories—the ability to memorize anything just by looking at it. Rajan Mahadevan, born in India in 1957, seemed to have such a memory. By the age of five, he was able to remember the license plate numbers of a parking lot full of cars. He was also able to remember a string of 31,811 digits. One book claimed that his memory power was a
  - natural talent. Later, however, Mahadevan visited with K. Anders Ericsson, a psychologist who believes that memory is a matter of training, not talent. They discussed Mahadevan's memory achievements, and Mahadevan explained that he had spent 1,000 hours and used memory techniques to memorize the 31,811 digits. He admitted that it was hard training that allowed him to do it, not a special memory.
- The winner of the 2011 World Memory Championships, held in Guangzhou, China, was 21-year-old Chinese national Wang Feng. He retained his title from the previous year by breaking world records for three of the competition's 10 memory games. These records were recalling 300 of 400 spoken numbers, and memorizing 500 numbers in five minutes and 2660 numbers in one hour. But Wang Feng says he had a "normal memory as a child," and no
  - special talent except for hard work and attention to detail. "I've spent three months preparing for this championship," he said. "Each day I spend five to six hours practicing. Actually, each year, I spend two to three months preparing for competitions."
  - Although many still think that people have either good or bad memories from birth, that need not be true. By using the methods of grouping, linking to vivid images, and the loci method, we can all enhance our memories. Who knows—you might even become the next World Memory Champion!



# MANGA, MANHWA, AND MANHUA



The concept of using pictures with words to tell a story has existed for thousands of years, since the ancient civilizations in Egypt and China. The first published comic book using speech balloons to show dialog is often reported to be *The Yellow Kid*, which debuted in 1896. The content of early comic books was nearly always humorous—

- E. Segar's famous *Popeye* is one example. In the early 20th century, however, comic book plots became more diverse, with many hero and adventure stories. Many western comic books made their way to countries in Asia, where they inspired generations of cartoonists.
- In the U.S. and many European countries, the best known type of East Asian comic book is probably Japanese *manga*. In the 1950s and '60s, the Japanese artist Osamu Tezuka produced a variety of manga for children, such as *Kimba the White Lion* and *Astro Boy*. His books often included
- mature and tragic themes. By the 1980s and '90s, manga was no longer just for young children. It had conquered the teenage and young adult markets as well. In fact, by the late 20th century, manga represented 40 percent of all Japanese publishing.



The South Korean version of comic books or graphic novels is called *manhwa*. Much of early 20th century manhwa was used to speak out against oppression and injustice. Around the time of the Korean War in the 1950s, manhwa also provided a welcome escape for young people. Today, South Korea is a highly-developed country and has some of the fastest Internet speeds in the world, so many people prefer to read manhwa (or translations of manga) online via computer or cell phone. Many popular Korean television dramas and movies have been based on manhwa. Over the last few years, interest in all things Korean has been on the rise around the world, which has led to an increase in manhwa sales.



Astroboy

There is a long tradition of comic books in Chinese. The development of special printing techniques in the 19th century allowed the growth of *lianhuantu*—picture books which told a story. The modern term for comic books and graphic novels written in Chinese is *manhua*; some of them are original stories while others are translations from Japanese manga. As in Korea, manhua have been used both for the expression of political opinions and as entertainment. Recently, a type of manhua genre called *wuxia* has become popular. These softcover or hardcover comics usually involve martial arts combat, like kungfu. The famous story *Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon* can be read as a wuxia comic. A well-drawn and well-written wuxia comic can provide a similar experience to an exciting martial arts movie.

Asian comics are a growing influence in western countries, where the market for them is increasing each year. The biggest consumer of manga outside of Japan is France. "In Europe, manga is most popular in France, then Italy and Spain," said Hyoe Narita, president of VIZ Media Europe, a Japanese entertainment company. About ten million manga books are sold in France annually. Japanese manga has had a strong influence on French cartoonists, who try to combine Asian and European drawing techniques. A new "French manga" genre emerged, known as *La nouvelle manga* ("the new manga").

Manga, manhwa, and manhua have all made great progress in recent decades and their influence on how the West views comics is getting stronger. Thanks to the Internet and a number of small independent comic distributors, a growing number of fans outside Asia can now follow and enjoy the latest manga, manhwa, and manhua.
