One morning, the teacher needed to go to the nearest town. Before he left he told his students, 'You must read and write without me all morning.'





'Let's look in the teacher's basket,' said the little boy. 'I want to know his secret.' 'Me too,' said his friend.





'Why do you say that?' he asked. 'Because,' said the girl, 'when a man sits by that well, he must marry the girl from this cottage.'








The Polish prince understood at once. 'I don't need a glass,' he said. 'I can see something better to drink from.'
