

As an elementary school teacher, I always try to think back to my own school days before I hand out an assignment. I believe that we aren't just teaching kids reading, or math, or science – we're teaching them life skills.

Here is one memory of my school days that really **gets your head around / sticks in my mind**. In the fourth grade, my teacher told us to pick our favorite poem and **learn it by heart / lose your train of thought**. Honestly,

7 What is poetry slam?

000

Simply put, poetry slam is the competitive art of performance poetry. It puts a dual emphasis on writing and performance, encouraging poets to focus on what they're saying and how they're saying it.

2 What is a poetry slam?

A poetry slam is a competitive event in which poets perform their work and are judged by members of the audience. Typically, the host or another organizer selects the judges, who are instructed to give numerical scores (on a 0 to 10 or 1 to 10 scale) based on the poets' content and performance.

3 Who gets to participate?

Slams are open to everyone who wishes to sign up and can get into the venue. Though everyone who signs up has the opportunity to read in the first round, the lineup for subsequent rounds is determined by the judges' scores. In other words, the judges vote for which poets they want to see more work from.

4 What are the rules?

Each poem must be of the poet's own construction. Each poet gets three minutes (plus a 10-second grace period) to read one poem. If the poet goes over time, points will be deducted from the total score. The poet may not use props, costumes, or musical instruments. Of the scores the poet receives from the five judges, the high and low scores are dropped, and the middle three are added together, giving the poet a total score of 0–30.

5 How does it differ from an open mike² reading?

Slam is engineered for the audience, whereas a number of open mike readings are engineered as a support network for poets. Slam is designed for the audience to react vocally and openly to all aspects of the show, including the poet's performance, the judges' scores, and the host's banter.

6 What can the audience do?

The official MC spiel of Poetry Slam, Inc., encourages the audience to respond to the poets or the judges in any way they see fit, and most slams have adopted that guideline. Audiences can boo or cheer at the conclusion of a poem, or even during a poem.

What kind of poetry is read at slams?

Depends on the venue, depends on the poets, depends on the slam. One of the best things about poetry slam is the range of poets it attracts. You'll find a diverse range of work within slam, including heartfelt love poetry, searing social commentary, uproarious comic routines, and bittersweet personal confessional pieces. Poets are free to do work in any style on any subject.

B How do I win a poetry slam?

Winning a poetry slam requires some measure of skill and a huge dose of luck. The judges' tastes, the audience's reactions, and the poets' performances all shape a slam event, and what wins one week might not get a poet into the second round the next week. There's no formula for winning a slam, although you become a stronger poet and performer the same way you get to Carnegie Hall — practice, practice, practice.

A dark yet thrilling novel, Fyodor Dostoevsky's *Crime and Punishment* focuses on the psychological aspects of murder. Published in 1866, the novel describes how the main character, Raskolnikov, plans and executes a murder and deals with the resulting guilt. Raskolnikov is a thoughtful though arrogant character. His arrogance prompts him to commit a terrible, even brutal, crime to prove his superiority.

Throughout the novel, Dostoevsky builds a tense, dramatic chain of events by simultaneously describing the criminal investigation and Raskolnikov's psychological state. His internal suffering eventually comes to an unpredictable though perhaps realistic resolution. Readers of *Crime and Punishment* may find it a disturbing, if not depressing, work. 

ONLINE PRIVACY: A Generational Divide

Recently I had my sociology class read an article about online privacy and security.

In my opinion, online privacy is a topic that should be taken¹ very seriously. Therefore I devoted an entire class period to the topic. I thought students would be surprised to discover how advertisers create ads for each consumer that are based on data² they have collected³ from previous purchases or product searches. I anticipated that they would be disturbed to learn about programs that are designed to search⁴ for keywords in your emails in order to target advertising. However, to my surprise, the students who are in my class⁵ did not seem at all concerned about online privacy and security. In fact, some students who were no doubt hoping to reassure me6 noted that it is sometimes beneficial to see advertisements that are directly targeted⁷ to their needs and interests. Many of my students said



that adjusting the settings which are on their account⁸ provides a sense of security.

When I asked them how they would feel about random people who live around the world⁹ viewing all their photos and other personal information on social networking sites, many of them reported that this idea was not something that they need to worry about¹⁰. For my students, personal information is something that can be <u>shared¹¹</u>. By the end of the class, I concluded that my students' views on online security were yet another example of the generational divide that <u>exists¹²</u> between those who grew up with technology and those who didn't.





2	And if you expand that to include Americans over 16 who have used an e-reader device or app to read news articles or magazine-style features, the figure jumps to 43 percent.

4	Also, a third of people who read e-content say they now spend more time reading than they did before e-books. This is especially true for people who own tablets and e-book readers.
5	This might be good for the economy. According to Pew, e-book users are "also more likely than others to have bought their most recent book, rather than borrowed it, and they are more likely than others to say they prefer to purchase books in general."
6	E-readers and tablets (including Amazon's Kindle Fire e-reader, which is a modified Android tablet) were a popular holiday gift item last year. Currently 28 percent of Americans age 18 and older own at least one tablet or an e-book reader. And that's not even counting the people who read books on a smartphone or iPod Touch app.
7	Then again, Pew also noted that e-book users often start searching for books online — which isn't great news for people who run brick-and-mortar bookstores.
8	For now, print reading material still rules the consumer market, however. Pew found that nearly three-fourths of U.S. adults read a printed book in 2011, and 11 percent listened to an audio book. Print books are especially popular when people read to children.
9	Print books are also the most popular choice when people want to borrow or lend a book. That's not surprising — recently author Dave Taylor explained step-by-step how to borrow a Kindle book from a public library. It's not too difficult, but is still considerably more complicated than walking into the library and pulling a book off the shelf.
10	The survey also found that just slightly more people prefer e-books over print for reading in bed.
11	On the flip side, Pew noted that nearly 20 percent of U.S. adults said they had not read a single book in the past year. In general, people who don't own electronic reading devices are more likely not to read much at all.
12	In addition, nearly 20 percent of Americans 16 and older said they had "physical or health conditions that made reading difficult or challeriging." Most of these people are older (25 percent of those over age 50), unemployed, or low-income. But an interesting aspect of e-book and audio book technology is its potential to improve the accessibility of written content.
13	Most e-reading devices allow the reader to adjust the font, font size, contrast, column width, and other factors to compensate for impaired vision. Plus, they often include text-to-speech technology that can read books or articles aloud — maybe not with thrilling delivery, but still a useful option. This can also be helpful to people with limited literacy.
14	The cost of e-reading devices keeps dropping, and it's likely that in the next year or two companies like Amazon may be giving away basic e-readers for free (on the principle that you can make more money selling "blades" than "razors").
15	As the price of e-readers approaches zero, it opens up more opportunities for people who have been left on the wrong side of the digital divide to access the same wealth of information, entertainment, and education as people with normal vision and average-or-better income.
16	Since the invention of writing, the written word has always disrupted the balance of power in societies. While e-books might have started out as a high-tech novelty for early adopters, they may ultimately prove to be a great equalizer across boundaries of ability, resources, and education.



THE CHANGING LANGUAGE OF THE INTERNET

Since its commercial explosion in the 1990s, the Internet has radically changed many aspects of our lives – the way we shop, how we communicate with each other, where we find out information, and, in some cases, where we work. It is even changing our very language, subtly but with great rapidity.

HOW THE INTERNET CHANGED THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE

- Even the word "Internet" has changed since its inception. While once upon a time spelling out the word with anything other than a capital "I" at the front would earn you a sharp reproach for failing to address a proper noun with the respect it deserved, these days it is more acceptable to use a lowercase "i," denoting a common noun. Why? Possibly because the Internet was once a more definitive object in its own right, referring to a tangible network of computers, whereas today the Internet has become a more abstract concept referring to the jumbled multitudes of information that can be found online.
- 3 Similarly, a "web site" (as in, a site on the Web) formed a new compound noun long ago to become "website." This is just one example of the internet creating new language to describe the objects that exist within its virtual realms.
- In many cases, the jury is still out on the specifics of these new terminologies that have been thrust into the English language, in many cases transitioning from buzzwords to everyday words within the click of a mouse.
- 5 "Electronic mail," once a wonderfully exotic signifier of a brave new age, has since become a word used casually dozens of times a day in offices and homes throughout the world. Since becoming a commonly used term, electronic mail has also become a compound noun, using only the first letter of the adjective part. But even some

BLOGGERS BLOGGING ON THEIR BLOGS

- "Blog" too has become a commonly used word in everyday conversation and serious journalism, to the extent that it's easy to forget it is a relatively recent blend, or portmanteau, of "web log." What's more, it's even given birth to its own verbs, i.e., "blogging" and "blog," and descriptive terms for people who indulge in such activities ("bloggers").
- 7 Google, meanwhile, is an impressive example of a proper noun that has become a verb synonymous with searching the Internet (to "google" something), within little more than a decade.
- 8 Even more recently, social networks have brought yet more neologisms to the table, and these days people are so busy "tweeting," "digging," and "friending," you'd be excused for mistaking the Internet for some sort of bizarre loved-up hippy commune.

Toads able to detect earthquake days beforehand, study says

- Toads may be able to detect earthquakes days before they hit, according to a study which reveals how the creatures deserted their mating site before Italy's L'Aquila quake last year. Toads may be able to detect imminent earthquakes, according to scientists. The finding will add to the accounts through the centuries where animals, from dogs to rats, snakes, and chickens, are said to have behaved strangely before an earthquake.
- 2 In the study published today in the Journal of Zoology, a colony of toads deserted their mating site three days before an earthquake struck in L'Aquila — the epicenter was 74 kilometers from the area where the animals had normally gathered. No toads returned to the site until 10 days later, after the last of the significant aftershocks had finished.
- ³ The discovery was made by accident by Rachel Grant, a life scientist at the Open University. She was studying the effects of lunar cycles on the toads' behavior and reproduction. "I was going out every evening at dusk and counting how many toads were active and how many pairs there were. Normally they arrive for breeding in early March and you get large numbers of males at the breeding site. The females get paired fairly quickly. They stay active and obvious around the breeding site until the spawning is over in April or May."
- 4 One day she noticed there were no toads. "Sometimes during the breeding season you get a drop in numbers if there's been a very cold night, but usually the day after, they come back again. It was very unusual that there was none at all."
- 5 There could be several mechanisms for animals to sense the beginnings of an earthquake, wrote Grant in the *Journal of Zoology*. They could detect seismic waves directly or ground tilt (which can occur in the minutes before a quake). In addition, there might be anomalies in the earth's magnetic field.

- 6 Looking for clues to explain the toads' behavior, Grant found that scientists had noticed disruptions in the ionosphere, the uppermost electromagnetic layer of the earth's atmosphere, at the time of the L'Aquila earthquake, which the toads may have detected. Previous earthquakes have had similar ionospheric disruptions associated with them. "I've spoken to seismologists who said there were a lot of gases released before the earthquake, a lot of charged particles. Toads and amphibians are very sensitive to changes in environmental chemistry, and I think these gases and charged particles could have been detected by the toads."
- Previously, fish, rodents, and snakes have been anecdotally associated with unusual behavior more than a week before an earthquake or at distances greater than 50 kilometers.
- 8 In 2003, Japanese doctor Kiyoshi Shimamura said that there was a jump in dog bites and other dog-related complaints before and after earthquakes. Before the 1995 earthquake in Kobe, a disaster that killed more than 6,000 people, he found that accounts of dogs barking "excessively" went up by 18 percent on average in the months before the earthquake. Above the epicenter on Awaji Island, there was a 60 percent increase in complaints compared with a year earlier.
- 9 Grant's work is not the first time toads have been associated with sensing the precursors of earthquakes. "In 2008, there was a big earthquake in Szechuan province in

China, and there was unusual migration of toads seen," she said. "I'd like to study it further and look at animal behavior in combination with seismological and geophysical precursors."



THE INVENTION OF PAPER

- Written communication has been the center of civilization for centuries. Most of our important records are on paper. Although writing has been around for a long time, paper hasn't.
- In fact, putting thoughts down in written form wasn't always easy or practical. Early people discovered that they could make simple drawings on the walls of caves, which was a great place for recording thoughts, but wasn't portable.
- Imagine spending hours scratching a message into a heavy clay tablet and then having to transport it. That's exactly what the Sumerians did around 4000 BCE. Although this form of written communication was now portable, it still wasn't practical because of its weight.
- 4 For centuries, people tried to discover better surfaces on which to record their thoughts. Almost everything imaginable was tried. Wood, stone, ceramics, cloth, bark, metal, silk, bamboo, and tree leaves were all used as a writing surface at one time or another.
- ⁵ The word *paper* is derived from the word *papyrus*, which was a plant found in Egypt along the lower Nile River. About 5,000 years ago, Egyptians created "sheets" of papyrus by harvesting, peeling, and slicing the plant into strips. The strips were then layered, pounded together, and smoothed to make a flat, uniform sheet.
- No major changes in writing materials were to come for about 3,000 years. The person credited with inventing paper is a Chinese man named Ts'ai Lun. He took the inner bark of a mulberry tree and bamboo fibers, mixed them with water, and pounded them with a wooden tool. He then poured this mixture onto a flat piece of coarsely woven cloth and let the water drain through, leaving only the fibers on the cloth. Once dry, Ts'ai Lun discovered that he had created a quality writing surface that was relatively easy to make and was lightweight. This knowledge of papermaking was used in China before word was passed along to Korea, Samarkand, Baghdad, and Damascus.
- 7 By the tenth century, Arabians were substituting linen fibers for wood and bamboo, creating a finer sheet of paper. Although paper was of fairly high quality now, the only way to reproduce written work was by hand, a painstaking process.
- 8 By the twelfth century, papermaking reached Europe. In 1448, Johannes Gutenberg, a German, was credited with inventing the printing press. (It is believed that moveable type was actually invented hundreds of years earlier in Asia.) Books and other important documents could now be reproduced quickly. This method of printing in large quantities led to a rapid increase in the demand for paper.



It has been suggested that the art of writing with a pen or pencil is not worth teaching anymore. Protect Business Records and Inventory

PROTECTING YOUR PROPERTY FROM NATURAL HAZARDS

- Most businesses keep on-site records and files (both hardcopy and electronic) that are essential to normal operations. Some businesses also store raw materials and product inventory. The loss of essential records, files, and other materials during a disaster is commonplace and can not only add to your damage costs but also delay your return to normal operations. The longer your business is not operating, the more likely you are to lose customers permanently to your competitors.
- 2 To reduce your vulnerability, determine which records, files, and materials are most important; consider their vulnerability to damage during different types of disasters (such as floods, hurricanes, and earthquakes) and take steps to protect them, including the following:
 - Raising computers above the flood level and moving them away from large windows
 - Moving heavy and fragile objects to low shelves
 - Storing vital documents (plans, legal papers, etc.) in a secure off-site location
 - Regularly backing up vital electronic files (such as billing and payroll records and customer lists) and storing backup copies in a secure off-site location
 - Securing equipment that could move or fall during an earthquake
 - Prior to hurricanes, cover or protect vital documents and electrical equipment from potential wind driven rain, which may breech the building envelope through windows, doors, or roof systems.

TIPS

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- 3 Keep these points in mind when protecting your business records and inventory:
 - Make sure you are aware of the details of your flood insurance and other hazard insurance policies, specifically which items and contents are covered and under what conditions. For example, if you have a home business, you may need two flood insurance policies, a home policy and a separate business policy, depending on the percentage of the total square footage of your house that is devoted to business use. Check with your insurance agent if you have questions about any of your policies.
 - When you identify equipment susceptible to damage, consider the location of the equipment. For example, equipment near a hot water tank or pipes could be damaged if the pipes burst during an earthquake, and equipment near large windows could be damaged during hurricanes.
 - Assign disaster mitigation duties to your employees. For example, some employees could be responsible for securing storage bins and others for backing up computer files and delivering copies to a secure location.
 - You may want to consider having other offices of your company or a contractor perform some administrative duties, such as maintaining payroll records or providing customer service.
 - Estimate the cost of repairing or replacing each essential piece of equipment in your business. Your estimates will help you assess your vulnerability and focus your efforts.
 - For both insurance and tax purposes, you should maintain written and photographic inventories of all important materials and equipment. The inventory should be stored in a safety deposit box or other secure location.
 - Periodically evaluate the building envelope to make sure that wind and water are not able to penetrate the building. Do regular maintenance and repairs to maintain the strength of the building envelope.



THE IMPORTANCE OF FAMILY DINNERS

- In many of today's households, family dinners have become a thing of the past. With busy schedules held by both parents and children, many families rarely have time to eat dinner together. In recent years, nutrition professionals have been promoting family dinners as research demonstrates the benefits that eating together can provide to family members.
- 2 You may be wondering, "Why are family dinners so important?" Research has suggested that having dinner as a family on a regular basis has positive effects on the development of adolescents. Family dinners

have been linked to a lower risk of obesity, substance abuse, eating disorders, and increased chance of graduating from high school. This document takes a closer look at some of these "dinner dynamics."

CONVERSATION

3 Conversations at the dinner table expand the vocabulary and reading ability of children. This benefit is not dependent on the socioeconomic status of a family; children in all families do better when they engage in dinner conversations. Dinner conversations allow children the opportunity to talk to their parents and siblings and to have an active voice within the family. They also provide opportunities for children to listen to others as well as express their own opinions. Family dinners allow every member of the family a chance to discuss his or her day and share any exciting news.

4 Suggestions for conversation

- Discuss the child's day. Ask questions that express your interest in your child's daily life.
- Discuss current events. Bring up news appropriate to the age of your child.
- Pick and choose. Create topics together; write them on a piece of paper and randomly choose one to discuss each night.
- Let all family members talk. Be an active listener and be sure your child learns to listen as well.
- Encourage your child to participate. Do not underestimate your child's ability to hold a conversation.



NUTRITIONAL QUALITY OF THE DIET

5 Eating dinner as a family has been shown to increase the intake of fruits and vegetables, which provide a variety of nutrients and dietary fiber. (For specific food group recommendations at various calorie intakes, visit the website www.mypyramid.gov.) Some studies also have shown that families who eat dinner together tend to eat fewer fried foods and drink less soda. Family meal frequency also is positively linked to the intake of protein, calcium, and some vitamins.

6 Suggestions for mealtime

- Make cooking a family activity and include everyone in the preparation process.
- Try fun recipes or old recipes with healthier alternatives.
- Have theme nights such as Italian night, Mexican night, or Caribbean night.
- Create your own original recipes using low-fat ingredients.
- Have family cook-offs.

DEVELOPMENT OF ASSETS

7 Internal assets such as having a positive outlook on personal future and a positive identity are linked to the frequency of family dinners. High-risk behaviors, such as smoking, are less frequent among families who eat meals together more frequently. Concerning boundaries and parental expectations, families who have regular family dinners are more likely to understand, acknowledge, and follow boundaries than those who do not eat dinner together. Self-esteem, motivation, and a decrease in highrisk behaviors are all related to the amount of time spent with family, especially during family dinners.

8 Final family dinner suggestions

- Have family dinners at least four to five times a week.
- Turn off TV, radio, MP3 players, and the like during dinner.
- Enjoy positive conversation during the meal.
- Spend at least an hour eating dinner, conversing, and cleaning up together.



GOING TO CALIFORNIA: 49ers and the Gold Rush

- James Marshall found gold while working for John Sutter at his ranch in Northern California on January 24, 1848. He had been hired to build a mill for Sutter. This place would enter American lore as "Sutter's Mill." Word quickly spread through California, the rest of America, and eventually the world, and people flocked to California to make their fortune. Many of the gold seekers came from as far away as Latin America and China. In fact, according to some estimates, the population increased by 86,000 people in two years. Most of these treasure seekers left for California in 1849, hence our name for them: 49ers. Many of the 49ers themselves picked an appropriate name from Greek mythology: Argonauts. These Argonauts were in search of their own form of a golden fleece – wealth free for the taking. The trek was arduous for those who came over land. ¹ □ It could sometimes take up to nine months to get to California. For the immigrants who came from across the ocean, San Francisco became the most popular port of call. In fact, San Francisco's population grew from about 800 in 1848 to over 50,000 in 1849. As a result of this growth, new towns, roads, schools, and churches were built.
- ² The first lucky arrivals were able to find nuggets of gold in the streambeds. These people made quick fortunes. ² It was a unique time in history where individuals with literally nothing to their name could become extremely wealthy. The gold was free for whoever was lucky enough to find it. It is no surprise that gold fever hit so heavily. Yet the majority of those who made the trek out West were not so lucky. The individuals who became the richest were in fact not these early miners, but were instead entrepreneurs who created businesses to support all of the prospectors. ³ It is easy to think of all the essentials this mass of humanity would need in order to live. Businesses sprang up to meet their needs. Some of these businesses are still around today, including Levi Strauss and Wells Fargo.
- ³ The individuals who made their way out West during the Gold Rush met with numerous hardships. After making the journey, they often found the work to be extremely hard with no guarantee of success. Further, the death rate was very high. ⁴ According to Steve Wiegard, staff writer for the *Sacramento Bee*, "one in every five miners who came to California in 1849 was dead within six months." Lawlessness and racism were rampant. However, the impact of the Gold Rush on American history cannot be overestimated.
- ⁴ The Gold Rush reinforced the idea of Manifest Destiny. America was destined to span from Atlantic to Pacific, and the accidental discovery of gold made California an even more essential part of the picture. ⁵ California was admitted as the 31st state in the union in 1850.







Robots are taking mid-level jobs, changing the economy

- 7 Computers and robots will replace humans in enough jobs that they will dramatically change the economy, said industry watchers and MIT economists at a robotics symposium Monday. And, they said, the transition has already started.
- 2 "What we're finally seeing is that our digital helpers aren't just catching up to us, but, in some cases, are passing us," said Andrew McAfee, an MIT economist and co-author of the book *Race Against the Machine*. "In some head-to-head contests, machines have raced past us."
- 3 Speaking at the symposium at MIT, McAfee noted that IBM's Watson supercomputer recently bested human champions on the *Jeopardy* game show. A Google self-driving car has been coursing around California, and the military is using robots on the ground and in the air in combat zones.
- 4 "We thought human beings held the high ground in a lot of these areas," McAfee said. "We looked around and suddenly saw computers doing things they weren't supposed to be good at.... We're going to see computers, robots doing a lot of jobs that humans are holding today."
- 5 But humans needn't get nervous.
- 6 McAfee isn't saying robots are about to become our managers. They're not going to run companies or hold department meetings. However, they will be replacing people in company call centers. They'll also be doing financial and industry analysis and a lot of mid-level kinds of jobs that people are paid to do today.
 - "There's a shift in how work gets done and how wealth is allocated," said Erik Brynjolfsson, director of the MIT Center for Digital Business. "Not so many people will be needed to work at H&R Block now that there's software to do our taxes."
 - Some jobs will be fairly safe at least for the foreseeable future, according to David Autor, an MIT



economist. Autor said that low-skilled and low-paying jobs, such as dog groomers, restaurant wait staff, and barbers, should be safe. Those are jobs that would be tough for computers or robots to take on.

- 9 High-skilled, high-paying jobs, such as hightechnology workers and healthcare providers, should also be safe.
- 10 The shift is going to come in the middle of the workforce, Autor said. Mid-level paying jobs requiring mid-levels of education are in danger of being lost to technology.
- "Think clerical and administrative support," he added.
 "Support and file and copy are more and more being done by machinery. . . . This is not unique to the United States, which makes it important as an [economic and global] phenomenon. In every country, middle jobs are contracting."
- 12 However, Autor said it's a fallacy that there's only a certain amount of work to be done and that machines will eliminate all jobs and leave people with nothing to do.
- 13 "Technology doesn't eliminate jobs altogether," he said. "And it does raise wealth. But it doesn't always have a positive distribution.... We shouldn't be worried that we're going to run out of jobs, but we may not like all the jobs being created. It's something we should be paying attention to."

Why are newspapers dying?

The future of print journalism remains unclear

- 1 For people in the news business, it's hard to avoid the sense that newspapers are at death's door. Every day brings news of layoffs, bankruptcies, and closings in the print journalism industry.
- 2 But why are things so dire at the moment?
- The decline begins with radio and TV
 3 Newspapers have a history that dates back centuries. And while their roots are in the 1600s, newspapers thrived in the U.S. well into the twentieth century.
- ⁴ But with the advent of radio and later TV, newspaper circulation (the number of copies sold) began a gradual but steady decline. By the mid-twentieth century, people didn't have to rely on newspapers as their sole source of news. That was especially true of breaking news, which 12 could be conveyed more quickly via broadcast media.
- 5 And as television newscasts became more sophisticated, TV became the dominant mass medium. This trend accelerated with the rise of CNN and 24-hour cable news networks.

Newspapers begin to disappear

- 6 Afternoon newspapers were the first casualties. People coming home from work began turning on the TV instead of opening a newspaper, and afternoon papers in the 1950s and 1960s saw circulations plunge and profits dry up. TV also increasingly captured more of the ad revenue that newspapers had relied on.
- 7 But even with TV grabbing more audience and ad dollars, newspapers managed to survive. Papers couldn't compete in terms of speed, but they could provide the in-depth news coverage that TV news never could.
- 8 So savvy editors retooled papers with this in mind. More stories were written with a feature-type approach that emphasized storytelling over breaking news, and papers were redesigned to be more visually appealing, with emphasis on clean layouts and graphic design.

The emergence of the Internet

9 But if TV represented a body blow to the newspaper industry, the World Wide Web may be the nail in the coffin. With the emergence of the Internet in the 1990s, vast amounts of information were suddenly free for the taking. Most newspapers, not wanting to be left behind, started websites in which they essentially gave away their most valuable commodity – their content – for free. This model continues to be predominant today.

10 Now, many analysts believe this was possibly a fatal mistake. Many once-loyal newspaper readers realized that if they could conveniently access news online for free, there was little reason to pay for a newspaper subscription.

The recession worsens print journalism's woes

- 11 Recent economic hard times have accelerated the problem. Revenue from print ads has plunged, and even online ad revenue, which publishers hoped would make up the difference, has slowed. And websites like Craigslist have eaten away at classified ad revenue.
- 12 "The online business model just won't support newspapers at the level Wall Street demands," says Chip Scanlan of The Poynter Institute, a journalism think tank. "Craigslist has decimated newspaper classifieds."
- 13 With profits plunging, newspaper publishers have responded with layoffs and cutbacks, but Scanlan worries this will make things worse.
- 14 "They're not helping themselves by whacking sections and laying people off," he says. "They're cutting the things that people look for in newspapers."
- 15 Indeed, that's the conundrum facing newspapers and their readers. All agree that newspapers still represent an unrivaled source of in-depth news, analysis, and opinion, and that if papers disappear, there will be nothing to take their place.

What the future holds

- 16 Opinions abound as to how newspapers can survive. Many say papers must charge for their web content in order to support print issues. Others say printed papers will soon go the way of the Studebaker* and that newspapers are destined to become online-only entities.
- 17 But what actually happens remains anybody's guess.





Second Mona Lisa unveiled for first time in 40 years

- It's a mystery straight out of the *Da Vinci Code*. A famous portrait, hidden away in a Swiss bank vault for 40 years, with the potential to break open a mystery more than 500 years old. A second, earlier version of the *Mona Lisa* was unveiled to the public today, a version that experts say they can prove is the work of the master himself.
- 2 Known as the Isleworth Mona Lisa, the painting was discovered shortly before World War I by English art collector Hugh Blaker, who purchased it from the noble family to which it had previously belonged. Blaker then moved the painting to his studio in Isleworth, England, giving it its iconic name.
- ³ During WWI, the painting was moved to America for safekeeping. The portrait eventually made its way back to Europe, where it was analyzed in Italy before being sent to the Swiss bank vault for safekeeping. Since that time, experts from the non-profit Mona Lisa Foundation have been working to prove or disprove the portrait's authenticity.
- When we do a very elementary mathematical test, we have discovered that all of the elements of the two bodies – the two people, the two sitters – are in exactly the same place," art historian and foundation member Stanley Feldman told The Associated Press.
- ⁵ "It strikes us that in order for that to be so accurate, so meticulously exact, only the person who did one did the other. ... It's an extraordinary revelation in itself, and we think it's valid."
- 6 Such similarities aside, the two *Mona Lisa*'s have many notable differences, the Isleworth version is

larger and features columns on either side of the figure, believed to be Lisa del Giocondo. The version that hangs in Paris' Louvre Museum is narrower and features no such columns.

7 The Isleworth painting was done on canvas, while the

Louvre painting, which features a far more detailed background, was done on wood. The woman in the Isleworth version also appears younger than she does in the Louvre, leading to the theory that the portrait might have been painted earlier, consequently featuring a younger del Giocondo.

- *8* The foundation's claims aside, many in the art and scientific community remain unconvinced.

BOYS and GIRLS: not as different as we thought

- For decades, psychologists and researchers have been telling us the same old thing

 boys and girls are fundamentally
 different. Their brains are different,
 their childhood development is
 different, their perceptions of the
 world around them are different.
 It's the old nature versus nurture debate,
 with many parents unmistakably believing
 that nature is the primary force in a child's
 development and that all parents can do is
 hang on for the ride.
- ² But a new book by Lise Eliot, PhD, suggests that many of these differences are what we, the adults, make of them. She's done the equivalent of a meta-analysis on the research foundation for gender differences between boys and girls, and put into a consumer-digestible format. The results are summarized in her new book, *Pink Brain, Blue Brain.* As *Newsweek* summarized:
- ³ How we perceive children sociable or remote, physically bold or reticent — shapes how we treat them and therefore what experiences we give them. Since life leaves footprints on the very structure and function of the brain, these various experiences produce sex differences in adult behavior and brains — the result not of innate and inborn nature but of nurture.
- 4 The gist of her findings is that many of the differences that parents believe are innate or nature-led are not. Motor skills? The same. Ability to have deep emotional feelings? The same. Aggressiveness? The same. Why do we observe such differences in little boys and girls? Because parents often unconsciously reinforce the gender stereotypes within their children:
- ⁵ "Oh, little Sally can't run as quickly as little Bobby."
- 6 "Oh, Mikey is always so aggressive; Angela is an angel in comparison!"

- 7 "Since little Eric doesn't seem to express many emotions, he must not be as emotional as little Hannah, who has an outburst at the drop of a hat!"
- 8 Our children become a self-fulfilling prophecy they turn into the kids we, by and large, imagine them to be. Parents don't usually do this consciously, of course. It is the stereotyped roles hammered into us at an early age, reinforced by consumerism and toy makers and commercials, and our own mothers and fathers. Boys are athletic and competitive, while girls are less so, and more social and emotional. These are stereotypes we imprint on our children; they are not naturally this way.
- 9 There are *some* differences the research supports with robust data. Dr. Eliot found that girls write better and more easily than most boys, and that boys have a better sense of spatial navigation than girls (like in reading a map).
- 10 What Dr. Eliot is saying isn't really new. We've known for years that infant brains are extremely malleable. But she's put it into simple language and has done a good job summarizing the vast body of research to really help put all of that data into some context. Her argument that small differences at birth become amplified over time as we all work to reinforce the gender stereotypes resonates.
- 11 Children must learn to stray from their comfort zones, with parents helping them try new things and explore new ways of expressing themselves that perhaps don't feel natural at first, but will often come with time. Boys, for instance, should be encouraged and reinforced for being able to express their feelings. The book not only goes into what few differences really exist, but also explains what parents can do to help encourage their kids to go outside of their comfort zones.

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
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
